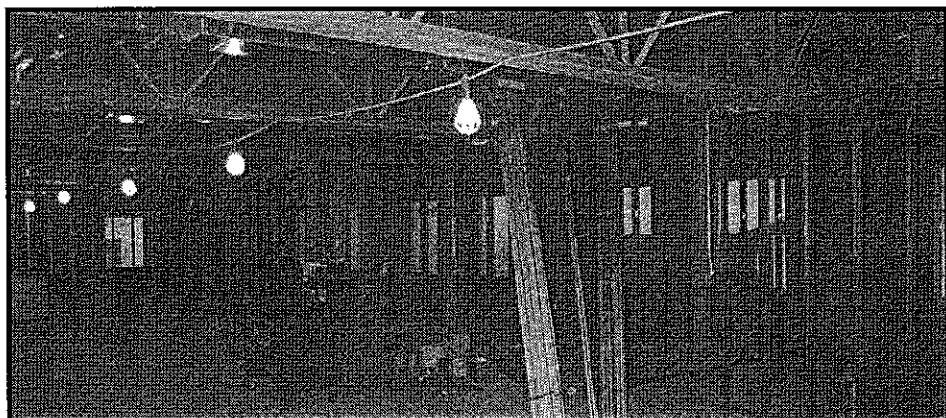
Opening soon – New Student Life and Technology Learning Center

After many years of hoping and several years of planning, the establishment of a UTTC Student Life and Technology Learning Center will become a reality!! Ribbon-cutting ceremonies for the college's newest educational facilities are scheduled for Wednesday morning, May 15th at 10:00 a.m., on the south side of the James Henry Community Center.

"Substantial construction should be completed by the end of April," said Russell Swagger (St. Croix Chippewa), UTTC Dean of Student and Campus Services. "When it's open in May, our college students will have a central location for campus life activities along with access to state-of-the-art technology resources."

A variety of Tribal, state, and federal government dignitaries are expected to attend the grand



opening ceremonies, at which time the college will conduct its formal dedication in naming the building after a long-time colleague and friend of the college.

The new facilities are a result of funding support by the

U.S. Department of Education-Title III/SDIP program, the Economic Development Administration (EDA), and the U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development program.

Everyone is invited to attend this historic event.

We are in the second year of our new vocation, Tribal Management. We will have 3 students graduating in May 2002. Here are some testimonies from the Tribal Management students'.

"My name is Cliff Metcalf. I'm a student at UTTC in the Tribal Management program. Educating Indian students in the Tribal Management enhances your ability and teaches you management skills to help you ready for any career you may choose." Cliff Metcalf - Crow Creek, TM student.

"My name is Margeaux Walking Elk. I'm an enrolled member of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe. I will be graduating in May with my AAS in Tribal Management. I learned a lot from this program at UTTC. This really kept me on my toes, learning about different laws and policies involving the Native American issues. This is something I could take back to my Tribe. I plan on going on to Black Hills State University to pursue a degree in Political Science." Margeaux Walking Elk, Standing Rock, TM Student.

"My name is Lisa Young Bear. I will be graduating in May in the

Tribal Management vocation. I took the vocation because of the emphasis on Natives and how we go about things in our way of living. It's Management with an emphasis on Native Americans. The courses should be a requirement for anybody working with Tribal employment." Lisa Young Bear, TAT/TM student.

"My name is Tina Morning Star. I'm a Tribal Management student. I'm from the Prairie Island Community, Welch, MN. This is my first year in Tribal Management classes. I began in January of 2002. Casino operations and management course has given me the knowledge about Casinos. It also taught about the differences in NIGRA and IGRA which will help in casino operations. Tribal management helps for a career in any management field. It can also help with your personal life. It teaches you great organizational skills. All in all I have learned about the management program." Tina Morning Star, Prairie Island, TM student.

"Hi, my name is Jackie Foote. I'm an enrolled member of the Three Affiliated Tribes of Fort Berthold. I graduated from office technology in December of 2001. I became interested in Tribal Management. With the degree in technology, my background would fit right in the management and leadership of becoming a manager. I enjoy working with the other Tribal management students. I'm looking forward to

the internship this summer with the National Congress of American Indians." Jackie Foote, TAT/TM student.

"I'm Anthony Rodriguez. I'm an enrolled member of Sisseton Wahpeton Sioux Tribe. I'm currently a student at UTTC in the Tribal Management program. What I like most about this vocation is the teaching of management. This course teaches you Casino Operations and Management TM105. For example, I'm currently a shift supervisor at Arby's. I did not know how effective I would be as a manager. I used some of the things I learned in class and applied them to my job and now I'm an effective manager. I even got offered an assistant manager position. I thank the instructor for the classroom instruction that I was taught. Wellness Fair 2002

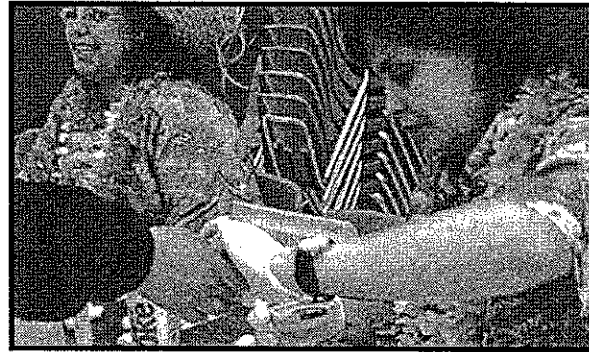

United Tribes Technical College Cisco Network Academy Program recognized for gender best practices

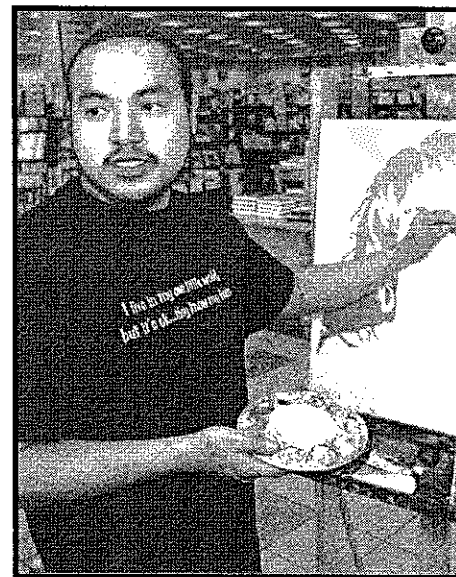
The United Tribes Technical College (UTTC) Cisco Network Academy program was recognized by the Gender Initiative of the Cisco Learning Institute for successfully enrolling and retaining significant numbers of female students in the program. In the fall of 2000, UTTC enrolled seven female students out of a total of sixteen (44%), with all but one completing the first semester program. This successful enrollment rate of female students was maintained in 2001.

A project of the Cisco Learning Institute and its partners, the Institute for Women in Trades, Technology and Science and the Academy for Educational Development, the Gender Initiative was established to address the

gender digital divide, and seeks ways to increase access to IT training and career opportunities.

Students enrolled in UTTC's Computer Support Technician Program advise female students to focus on the multiple certificates available in the Information Technology field as a means to open doors to financial independence. 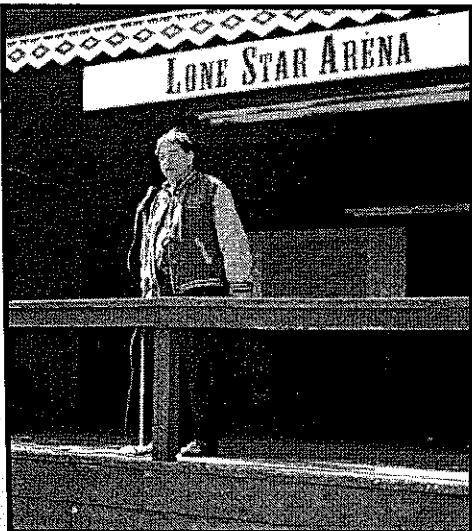

Dr. David M. Gipp, UTTC president, giving a speech at the Sobriety walk/run for the Chemical Health Department.

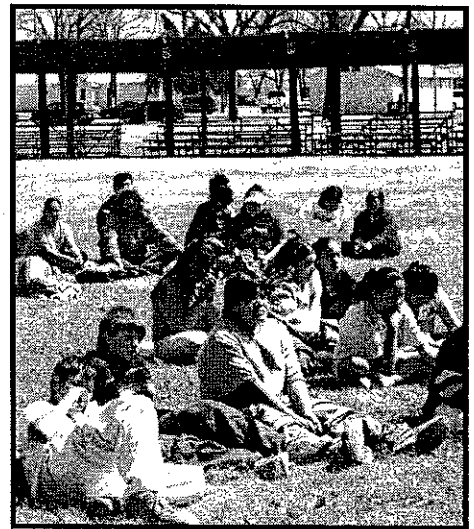

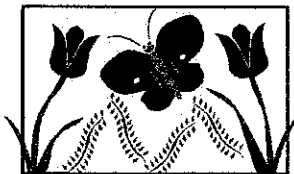
3, 4 and 5 Year Old Area

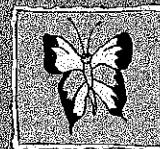

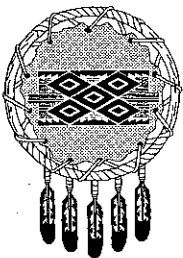
