Excavation work began on a new UTTC dormitory following groundbreaking on December 9. The building will house 86 students and is located near the cafeteria, just west and slightly south of the campus security building.

Campus Construction Projects Helped by Good Weather

Unseasonably mild weather in late fall has helped two major construction projects on the UTTC campus. Nearly completed is a classroom expansion at Theodore Jamerson Elementary School and excavation work began December 9 on a \$2.6 million dollar student dormitory project.

The Theodore Jamerson expansion provides four classrooms for students in grades three through six. The modular building was constructed on what was playground space at a cost of \$210 thousand with funds from the Office of Indian Education Programs of the B-I-A. At 3,200 square feet, the expansion almost doubles the size of the school.

"This is a show of growth and progress that helps to meet the elementary school needs of those attending college at UTTC and in the community," said Sam Azure, Elementary School Principal.

According to Azure, classroom equipment is to be transferred to the new rooms over the holiday break and ready to be used for instruction with

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Practical Nursing Program awarded 4year Approval



A representative from the ND Board of Nursing conducted an onsite review of the UTTC Practical Nursing program on October 9-10, 2002. The comprehensive review process included: on-site visits to students' clinical sites; observation of classroom teaching; interviews with UTTC administration, staff at clinical sites, students, and nursing faculty; review of faculty and student records; and review of program curriculum, assessment, and minutes. The findings of the on-site review were presented at the November 21st Board of Nursing meeting. The Board unanimously voted to approve the UTTC Practical Nursing Program for four years, the maximum approval time-period that can be awarded to a nursing program in North Dakota. Approval by the Board of Nursing is required to educate students towards a career in the nursing profession.

The Practical Nursing program is also accredited by the National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission. Success of the program is also measured by graduates' pass-rate with NCLEX-PN, the national licensure examination. The past three years graduates who have taken NCLEX-PN have had a 100% pass-rate. Currently in 2002, all students who have taken the NCLEX-PN have passed. Program successes are a reflection of the quality education they receive here at United Tribes Technical College, Nursing faculty are: Sherry Messmer, Donna Iszler, and Evelyn Orth.




These first graders look like they had a lot of fun. That's because they were singing in the Christmas program called "Santa's Star Search."

Safety Tip from North Dakota Worker's Compensation

Walking Safely in Winter Conditions

Plan ahead - plan your route and give yourself lots of time.

Wear boots or overshoes with grip soles so you have traction on snow and ice. Slick leather or rubber soles on dress shoes are unsafe on ice.

Don't walk with your hands in your pockets as this reduces your balance if you slip on the ice.

Don't carry or swing heavy loads such as large boxes or cases as they could cause you to lose your balance.

When walking, bend slightly forward so that your center of gravity is directly over your feet as much as possible. Curl your toes under and walk as flatfooted as possible.

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Take short to medium steps or shuffle your feet in very icy areas.

Don't step on uneven surfaces. Step well over or avoid curbs with ice on them.

When entering or exiting vehicles, be especially careful and use the vehicle for support. TIP: Keep a container of kitty litter behind your driver's seat so you can toss some out when exiting your vehicle in ice and snow.

Stick to designated walkways as much as possible - a shortcut over a snow pile or other area where snow and ice removal does not occur may not be worth it.

When you enter a building, remove snow and water from footwear to prevent creating wet, slippery conditions indoors.

Be prepared to fall:

Should you fall, fall with sequential contacts at your thigh, hip, and shoulder to avoid using, your arms to protect against breakage.

To prevent hitting your head on the pavement, bend your back and head forward




Gipp nominated to human relations committee

Even though I don't share your happiness during these times. I, too have a Christmas story to tell all the boys and girls, young and old. Hopefully, you appreciate my stance afterwards.


Christmas eve around 11:15 pm





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
