

Over 1,100 visited internment exhibit


BISMARCK, ND – Over 1,100 people attended the Snow Country Prison exhibit during its opening run at United Tribes Technical College. To be exact, 1,137 people visited the campus and viewed the exhibit in the UTTC Cultural Interpretive Center between October 4 and November 30.

The exhibit focused on the internment at Fort Lincoln of people the government deemed "enemy aliens" from 1941 to 1946; it featured photographs, artifacts, huge silk banners and haiku poetry. It was jointly sponsored by UTTC and the North Dakota Museum of Art. Approximately 200 people attended video screenings and public programs on the opening weekend October 4th and 5th. The primary docent at the exhibit was Murphy Sitting Crow.

The exhibit's next showing begins the weekend of February 28-29 at the North Dakota Museum of Art in Grand Forks.

Among the comments written in the guest-comment book: "I remember waving to the 'prisoners' as a youth as we drove by." "Never heard about this place back in the 40s." "Thank you for the knowledge." "I remember watching all the trucks as a small girl." "Great idea to give an apology and expose the misdeeds to other innocent individuals." "This history is fascinating. The story and visuals bring new meaning to this place." "Amazing, we need to learn to be kind to one another." "Many souls captured yet waiting to be released. May their souls find peace." "Thanks for telling a story that needs to be told." "Appreciated the tour very well done, emotions flowed. cried." "Good to see the place of peace now." "A sad commentary on America." "I love the haiku."



BISMARCK, ND – State lawmakers on the ND Legislative Council's Economic Development Committee heard about successful tribal businesses during a meeting at United Tribes Technical College. The December 2nd meeting in the Barden Building is the first time a committee

Lawmakers heard presentations about tribal businesses of the Mandan/Hidatsa/Arikara Nation, the Sisseton-Wahpeton Oyate, the Spirit Lake Nation and the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe. Discussion focused on creating business partnerships with tribes and securing more Small Business Administration (SBA) 8(a) contracts.

Corps grilled about water disaster on Standing Rock

BISMARCK, ND – Representatives of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers were in the cross hairs December 5 during a presentation to the United Tribes Board of Directors.

Standing Rock Tribal Chairman Charles Murphy bluntly expressed his deep dissatisfaction with the Corps over disruption in the water supply to Sanding Rock.

Low levels on Lake Oahe caused a loss of water to an estimated 10,000 people during the Thanksgiving Holiday week. Murphy blamed the disaster on the Corps for managing dams on the Missouri River to cater to downstream interests.

"This crisis showed what the Corps did to us," said Murphy to the group from the Corp's Omaha office. "What's the Corps doing for us now? Nothing."

Corps spokesman Bill



Chairman Charles Murphy warned of the "delta phenomenon," when low water levels cause the formation of silt that can clog water intake structures. "When that happens at Bismarck or other towns, look out. The Corps won't be standin' around useless then." Looking on, Shirley Bordeaux, UTTC finance dean.

Mulligan explained that the purpose of the visit was to report to tribes about the Corp's progress with legislation passed in 2000 to protect and improve the Missouri River. A provision of the "Missouri River Restoration" law calls for tribal membership on an advisory task force. Mulligan said the law may not be perfect, but he urged tribes to take a look and give it a chance.

Standing Rock Tribal Councilman Frank White Bull charged that the task force was stacked in



favor of the states. "Tribes suffered the major losses from the dams. There's not enough representation here for the tribal areas," he said. "The entire community of Kenel, SD was moved and this law says we still have to cost share for funding. It's unfair."

Tension during the discussi was eased somewhat by facilitate Mary Lee Johns, a Native American Consultation Specialist with the Corps. The meeting took place in the Jack Barden Center on the UTTC campus.

Author's talk defines 'Indian Education'

Author Joseph Marshall III raises this question about the meaning of the term Indian Education: "Is it education 'by' Indians or the education 'of' Indians?"

"For several hundred

vears it has meant the latter - the education 'of' Indians," he said in a December 1 talk at United Technical Tribes College. "Until recently it was not the education 'of' Indians 'by' Indians."

That's what Marshall identified as the crux of a presentation he prepared for UTTC faculty and staff. ho is doing the ducating and what's being taught? His talk. Indian Education: What it was. What it is, What it should be, was based on an essav commissioned of him by Brian Palecek, head of UTTC's general education department.

Marshall's eloquent and thought provoking answer covered the range of e d u c a t i o n experienced by member of Sinte Gleska University, Marshall observed that tribal education leaders have ultimately taken control of Indian education. Through enactment of tribal education laws, hiring of native educators and pre-European methodology into the contemporary curriculum." He urges a careful examination of the methods and philosophy used by people in the past, those of his great grandparents generation and earlier.

> W h a t about non-Indian teachers?

"If you're going to teach Indian students then you have a responsibility, whether you're Indian or non Indian, to know where we come from...anyone involved in the education of Indian students. in any way, shape or form, has a responsibility to be well versed in the past. Where we come from is important."

The result, he savs, will be Indian students who are culturally and historically aware, have a stronger sense of identity, and who will enter the mainstream as well-rounded individuals. "It comes down to knowing who vou are as a native person. We owe it to

American Indians from the precontact period through the everchanging array of governmentandated programs that came after. dian education, he said, is best understood when seen in its historic context.

A founder and charter board

administrators, election of native school board members, and the formation of tribal colleges, they've turned a negative into a positive, he said.

Marshall's definition of Indian education: "Education of Indians by Indians incorporating and/or adapting

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native kids to teach them what they're about. That's what Indian Education should be."

According to Palecek, Marshall's essay on the subject of Indian Education, along with a videotape of his talk, will be made available soon and perhaps distributed to a wider audience.



During this conference and the United Tribes Powwow, the Injury Prevention Program conducted a child passenger safety seat check. New child passenger safety seats





TJES Tidbits #6


