The mission of the Sacred Child Project is to assist the four tribes in North Dakota. Including the Trenton Indian School Area to develop a strategic mental health plan for adolescents on the reservations in North Dakota as well as to develop a financial package to sustain the system after the life of the grant. It will also implement the wrap-around process for families and children on the Standing Rock, Spirit Lake, Three Affiliated Tribe, Turtle Mountain reservation and the Trenton Indian services area. The wrap-around process is a cutting edge concept that is currently being used when working with families and children with multiple and complex needs. Unconditional care is given to the child utilizing both formal and informal supports in an effort to keep the family intact. This philosophy is very similar to the Native American concept of the extended family, clanships, tiospaye and other familial structure whereby the community serves as a support to families.

Currently, staff are being hired for each of the reservations. Future articles will continue to provide updates on the project. For more information, please call 255-3285, ext. 385.

## How to Avoid Problems when Takine Antibiotics

- If you have ever had an allergic reaction to a medication, tell your health care provider! Know the specific name of the medication you are allergic to and the reaction that occurred.
- If you are taking other medications, tell your health care provider. This includes contraceptives and over-the-counter medicines.
- Tell your health care provider if you are on alcohol or other drugs. - Ask about side effects, diet restrictions, or interactions with other medicines. Ask your pharmacist for a free information sheet with 'our prescription.


## Warning Signs when Taking Antibiotics

- If wheezing, difficulty breathing or swelling in the throat, mouth or face occur, stop the medicine and seek medical advice immediately.
- If the symptoms seem life-threatening (significant difficulty breathing or swallowing), call 9-1-1.
- If you develop a skin rash or severe itching, stop taking the medicine and call your health provider.
- If you have severe persistent diarrhea or nausea, or worsening fever, call your health care provider for advice about stopping or changing antibiotics.
