## Senior Advisor to the

Director brings extensive Tribal experience to the Agency

Ms. Carole Anne Heart, a Rosebud/Yankton Sioux tribal member, has been named Senior Advisor to the Director of the Indian Health Service.
"Ms. Heart's knowledge of the Indian education system will serve as the basis for a health education initiative," said Michael H. Trujillo, MD., M.P.H, M.S., and the Director of the Indian Health Service. "Among Ms. Heart's responsibilities will be to explore how the expertise and experience of Indian Health Service employees can assist tribal colleges develop health curricula and certification or diploma programs. In some instances it may be possible that employees could augment the teaching staff on particular health topics or programs." A goal of this initiative is to provide more opportunities and encouragement to American Indian and Alaska Native youth to consider health care careers. This initiative ties-in with some of the other Director's initiatives such as Indian Youth, Elder Care, Indian Women's Health, and Traditional Medicine.

In addition to the education initiative, Ms. Heart's Senior Advisor responsibilities also include advising the Director on sensitive or complex issues and administering special assignments that reflect the priorities, policies, interests, and philosophies of the Director. She also represents the Director in tribal, interdepartmental, and interagency deliberations of special issues or project for which the Director is responsible.

Ms. Heart received her Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology from the University of South Dakota (USD), and has also attended law school at USD. She is enrolled with the Rosebud Sioux tribe, originally from Milks Camp Community, the eastern most community of the Rosebud Reservation.

## Influenza (Flu)

## Definition:

Influenza (flu) is a viral infection of the nose, throat, trachea, and bronchi that occurs in epidemics every 3 to 4 years.
Symptoms:

1. Fever or aches - use Acetaminophen (Tylenol) every 4 to 6 hours. Dosage depends on the age of the child. Do NOT give aspirin.
2. Cough or hoarseness
3. Sore throat - Saltwater gargles and a diet of soft foods will soothe a sore throat.
4. Stuffy nose-Warm-water nosedrops and suction will open most blocked noses.

5. Chills
6. Headache

The Influenza vaccine gives protection for only 1 to 2 years. In addition, the vaccine itself can cause fever in $20 \%$ of the people who get shots and a sore injection site in $10 \%$. The vaccine is not recommended for healthy children. Only children with chronic diseases need to get yearly influenza boosters.

## CALL OR SEE A DOCTOR IMMEDIATELY IF:

Your child develops the following symptoms.

- an earache.
- sinus pain or pressure.
- a yellow nasal discharge lasting over 24 hours.
- a fever lasting 3 days or one that doesn't go down after giving Tylenol.
- difficulty breathing.

Amantadine - Drug of choice for prophylaxis or symptomatic treatment of influenza type $A$ virus.

Treatment should continue for 24 to 48 hours after symptoms disappear. Prophylaxis should start as soon as possible after initial exposure and continue for at least 10 days after exposure. If used with influenza vaccine, dose is continued for 2 to 3 weeks until protection from vaccine develops.

Adverse reactions: dizziness, irritability, insomnia, light-headedness, nausea, dry mouth, hypotension.

To be used cautiously in those with seizure disorders, CHF, peripheral edema, renal impairment, orthostatic hypotension, cardiovascular disease and in the elderly.

## Patient Teaching:

If orthostatic hypotension occurs, instruct the patient not to change positions too quickly. Report adverse reactions to the doctor, especially dizziness, depression, anxiety, nausea and urine retention.

## Chemical Health Center Dysfunctional Families

## Definition: Addiction

Addiction is a pathological relation with any mood altering event, experience, or things that causes major life problems.

- The top four Addictions: Chemical, Food, Sex, Work.
- Others include: Gambling, Spending, Shopping (including window shopping without buying), Exercise, Play, Danger, Thrills, Reading, Sleep, Religion, T.V., Caretaking.

Principles of Systems (Such as Families):

- Change in one member affects all
- The system is more powerful than the individual
- Addiction adversely effects the system

One of the key aspects of addiction is that feelings are repressed. The child who is not allowed to be naturally dependent in the process of growing up will become an adult who is insecure, fearful, and in pain. This child will be a prime candidate for addiction, because he or she will need to repress the unmet nee * and feelings in order to cope with life.

Common types of dysfunctional families are:

- Chemically dependent parents or grandparents
- Families with secrets (such as suicide, extramarital affairs, racial shame, disease, sexual abuse)
- Physical, sexual, or emotional abuse
- Rigidity is common within dysfunctional families.

Alcoholism contributes to other types of dysfunction within the families.

Alcoholic Families follow these rules:

- Don't Talk (Don't tell anyone about what is going on)
- Don't feel (You can't express or acknowledge anger, fear, or disgust)
- Don't Trust (You may be ridiculed, betrayed, manipulated, or used)

The alcoholic family system is often unpredictable and inconsistent within the family roles.
