Student Health Center Notes:

Immunizations for the nursery and preschool areas must be up to date by Friday, February 20th for admittance into the daycare areas. Those who are not up to date will not be allowed into daycare. If your child has already received the needed immunizations, it is the parent's responsibility to submit the updated immunization record to the daycare area and Student Health Center. Student Health has release of information forms available and parent's are permitted the use of the SHC telephone to obtain immunization information. Student Health nursing staff are available Monday-Friday from 8 am to 4 pm. On weekends, immunizations can be given Saturday & Sunday from 8 am to noon.

The latest recommendations from the State Health Department for the treatment to influenza are as follows:

Children who are symptomatic or have been diagnosed with influenza are contagious for approximately (7) days. Adults who are symptomatic or have been diagnosed with influenza are contagious for approximately (5) days. Once symptoms appear, children and adults are asked to remain at home to be treated. The illness is highly contagious within a small population such as United Tribes Technical College campus. Approximately 30 cases of influenza have been reported to the SHC. Once a person becomes symptomatic it is recommended that the person obtain a prescription of Amantadine to shorten the course of the illness. Amantadine must be obtained within 24-48 hours of the onset of symptoms to be effective.

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A few cases of Chickenpox have also have confirmed on campus. If your child has not had chickenpox before and has suspicious skin lesions, pustules, or a rash, please have it checked out by SHC nurses before taking them to the elementary or daycare areas.

SHC nurses transport those students who have medical or dental appointment to Ft. Yates PHS weekly. If you are in need of transportation, please make arrangements with SHC staff.
