This conference was presented by: Vicente de la Garza, Apache, M.A., M.P.H. Mr. Garza talents as a trainer, epidemiologist (medical scientist), Indian education material specialist, have led him to apply these skills to look for alcoholism's causative factors in a scientific way.

Larry Tsosi, Navajo, M.A. Mr. Tsosi, retired principal, teacher, BIA school, dormitory director, tells of his experience and teaches us new views to give us hope on educating our children.

This training for the Chemical Health Center was very informative. We learned new skills and other ways to help with drug and alcohol problems within the family system.

The training of High Risk Intervention for children and teens helped educate the staff with skills in identifying children and substance abusing families, without endangering them, provide a supportive learning environment to improve their academic achievement by doing this, help save the child from also becoming a substance abuser.

This same training program will be presented in Rapid City, South Dakota on Apri 10, 21, 22, 1998. T' program would be very informative to all staff at UTTC and other parents and School Board members who want to do something to save our children from drugs and alcohol.



- Ft. Yates Public Health will be providing mammograms and gynecological exams on Monday, April 20th. Clients are asked to check in as you would for Walk-in Clinic. If you are interested in going down, please contact the Student Health Center.

Mammograms are recommended as follows: Beginning at age 40, Every one to two years age 40-49, Every year from age 50.

Mammography is a procedure used to detect breast cancer. Often, mammography can detect breast cancer as much as two years before a lump is felt. One out of nine women in the United States will develop breast cancer during her life! Survival rates are significantly higher when breast cancer is detected early...as mammography can do! Breast Cancer is one of the leading causes of death in women ages 34-54!

- Students who have not submitted medical bills to the Student Health Center must do so at once so the bills can be paid. If a student receives a bill at his/her home address, the Student Health Center does not receive one.

- Student Health Center Office Hours: Monday-Friday 8:00 am to 4:00 pm, Saturday & Sunday 8:00 am to Noon (except holidays)

- Weekly transportation is provided to those students who have dental or medical appointments at Ft. Yates PHS. If you are in need of a ride or need to schedule an appointment, see the Student Health Center nursing staff.

New students have the option of enrolling in either the Criminal Justice Program or the Correctional Officer Training Program.




