**INTRODUCTION TO PUBLIC HEALTH
SAFETY MESSAGE ARTICLE**

“SAFETY FOR OUR CHILDREN - PROTECTING OUR FUTURE”

It is extremely important that children are taught safety measures and things to do in case of abduction or becoming lost. A child should know the following things:

- 1. Their name.**
- 2. Parents name.**
- 3. Their home phone number and how to dial 911.**
- 4. Their address.**
- 5. Various things a person can do to red flag law enforcement personnel, e. g. If placed in a trunk of a car tear out tail light wires or cross them.**
- 6. A central point to go to in case the child becomes lost, e.g. If attending a Pow Wow tell your child to go to the bowery if they become lost.**

The concept of safety that a child has depends on their age and the development level of the child. Teaching your child safety measures should begin as soon as a child is old enough to understand and continue throughout their life.

Prevention Intervention is a continuous process that is learned throughout a lifetime.

ASSESSMENT TIP OF THE WEEK:

Directed Paraphrasing

Estimated Levels of Time and Energy Required for:

Faculty to use:	Low
Students to respond	Medium
Faculty to analyze data collected	Medium

Description: In this classroom assessment, students are directed to paraphrase part of a lesson for a specific audience and purpose, using their own words.

Purpose: Directed Paraphrasing provides feedback on students' ability to summarize and restate important information or concepts in their own words; it therefore allows faculty to assess how well students have understood and internalized that learning.

Suggestions for use: Directed paraphrasing is particularly useful for assessing students' understanding of important topics or concepts they will later have to explain to others. In fields such as marketing, public health, education, and criminal justice, much of a student's eventual success depends on his or her ability to internalize specialized and often complex information and then to communicate it effectively to the public.

Examples:

Nursing: In one or two sentences, paraphrase what you have learned about hospice care to inform a dying but still lucid patient of its possible advantages over hospital or home care.

Computer Science: In plain language and in less than five minutes, paraphrase what you have read about computer viruses for a vice president of a large insurance firm who is ultimately responsible for database security. Your aim is to convince her to spend time and money "revaccinating" thousands of workstations.

Small-Business/Management: Imagine that you have just been invited to give a talk to a group of local small-business owners on specific ways in which proposed changes in the state tax code may affect them. Paraphrase, in one or two sentences, the proposed changes that are most likely to affect this audience.

Analyzing the data: assess responses for accuracy of the paraphrase, its suitability for the audience, and effectiveness in fulfilling the purpose. You could also circle the clearest and muddiest points in each paraphrase and look for common patterns of clarity and confusion.



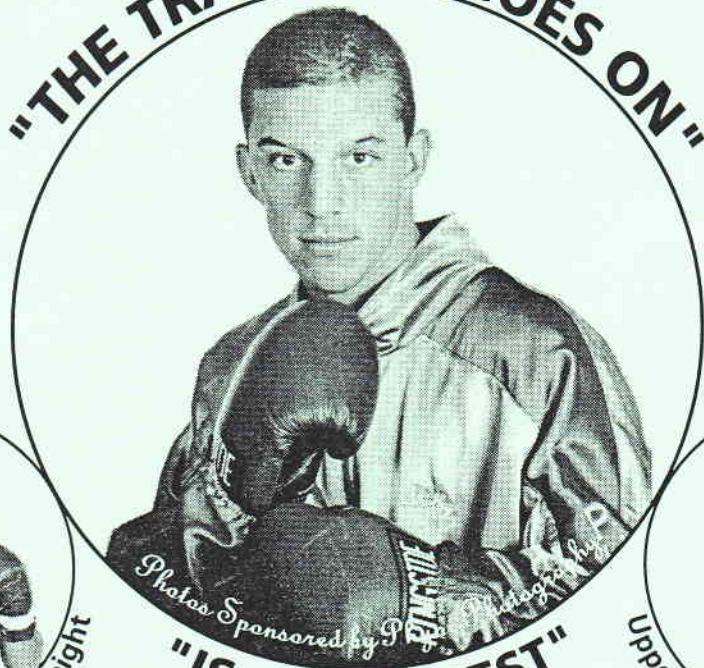
