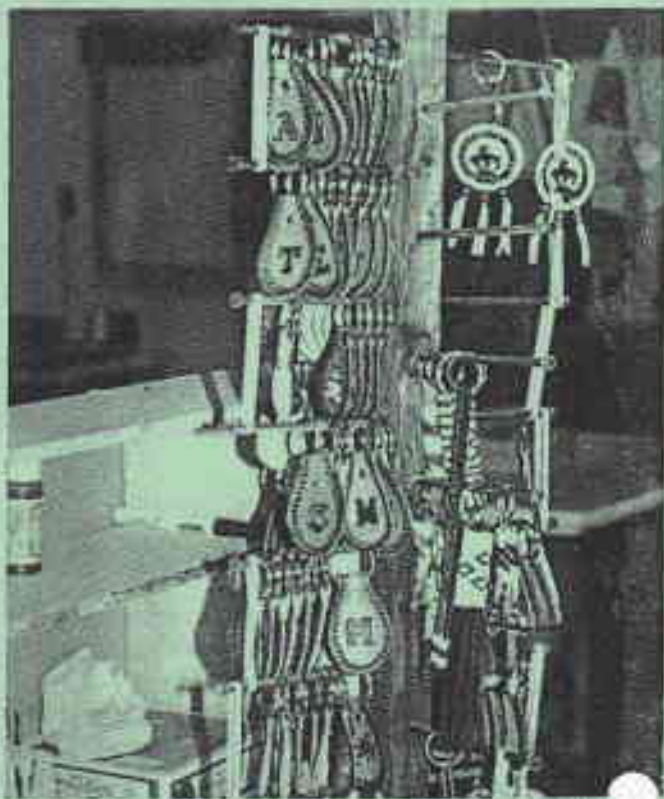
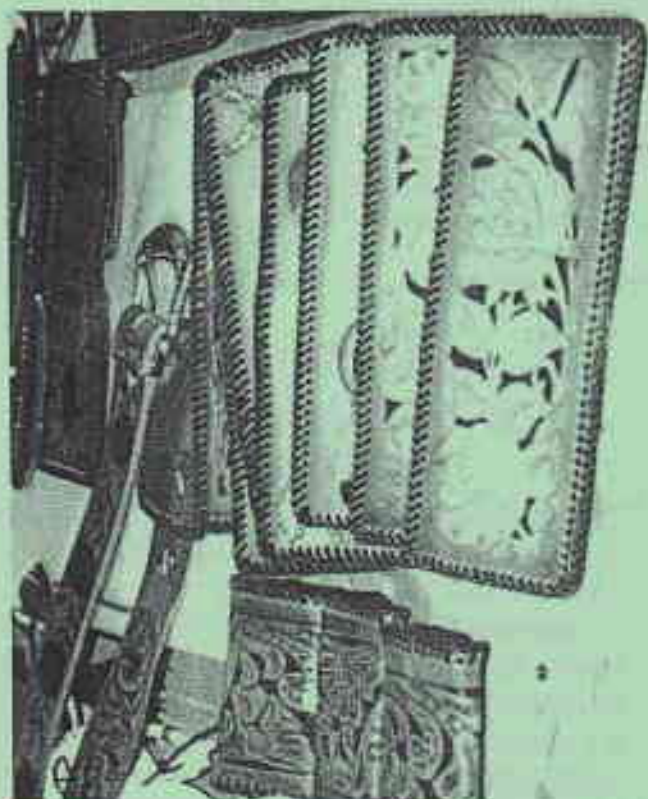

## AASPN Seeks Improvements

The Nursing Department is ever on the alert for upgrading within the Department. On October 29 nursing faculty met with Administrative nursing faculty at St. Alexius Medical Center, a major clinical facility for student learning.

Developments within the hospital were reviewed in terms of their influence on clinical opportunities for nursing students. In its recent survey by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Health Care Organizations, St. Alexius rate 97% (along with only 32 other health care settings within the nation). UTTC students are fortunate to get their learning experiences in a setting of this quality.

Nursing faculty told of the enlarged skills center in their Department, the revised course in Mental Health Nursing, the introduction of a leadership/management course in the curriculum, new teaching strategies being utilized in the program, the increasing availability of distance learning on the UTTC campus. Hospital staff were please to hear of the good results of student graduates in their Licensure Exams.

Anne Heid and Charleen Laschkewitsch are successfully continuing their masters studies at the University of Mary.

Sister Kathryn has been invited by the National League for Nursing to serve as a site visitor at schools seeking League accreditation. The UTTC Nursing Department attained Maximum Accreditation for its nursing program in May, 1995.
