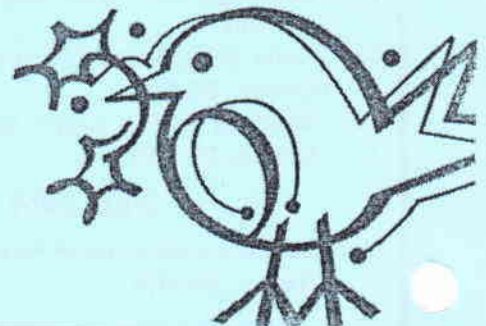

FINANCIAL AID

Attention!

Just a few reminders to write on your calendar . . .

FEDERAL STUDENT AID for 1997-98 - January 1, 1997 to June 30, 1998. You should apply as early as possible but not before January 1, 1997. Mailing in your form is only the first step in applying for Student Aid.

STATE STUDENT AID: The deadline for State Student Aid is April 15, 1997. This means your Pell Application needs have been processed by the U.S. Department of Education before April 15, 1997.

COLLEGE AID: United Tribes Financial Aid Office offers a few different institutional scholarships, and has information on others. These scholarships all have different deadlines, contact the Financial Aids Office at Ext. 209, or 211 for more information.

SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION:

- Scholarships are available to students of all backgrounds, abilities and levels. They are not limited to freshman entering college, students with high academic averages, or those who can demonstrate financial need.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF MINORITY AFFAIRS SCHOLARSHIP

For the ninth year, the North Dakota Education Association, in cooperation with its Minority Affairs Commission, is offering a \$500 Minority Affairs Scholarship.

The purpose of the scholarship is to encourage and assist minorities to enter the profession of teaching. As the enclosed brochure indicates, the applicant must be:

- * a minority undergraduate student in good standing;
- * enrolled in a North Dakota institution of higher education; and
- * enrolled in a teacher preparation program.

The brochure contains an application which may be duplicated and **must be received at the NDEA office by March 15, 1997**. Additional requirements are indicated on the application.

Application Procedure

Application forms must be submitted by March 15 and include the following:

- * A copy of the applicant's college transcript.
- * Three letters of recommendation; at least one must be from an educator.
- * An essay of 300 to 500 words on the applicant's personal goals, strengths and weaknesses.

Selection process

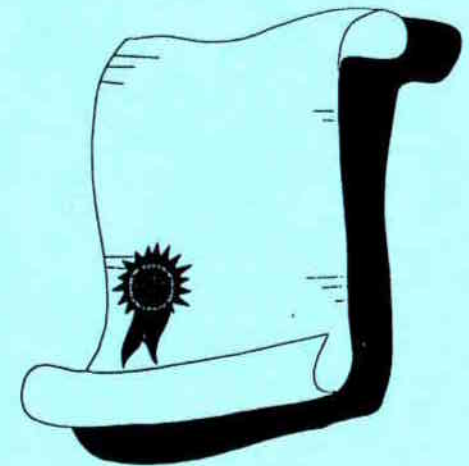
- * The winner will be selected by the Board of Trustees of the Foundation. However, prior to the review of the applications by the Board, references to names and communities will be removed from the material.

HISTORY

First awarded in 1988, the NDEA Minority Affairs Scholarship serves to encourage and assist minorities to enter the profession of teaching. Two \$500 scholarships are awarded annually upon the recommendation of NDEA's Minority Affairs Commission -- one to a University education student; one to a Tribal College education student.

CRITERIA

1. The applicant must be:
 - a minority undergraduate student in good standing.
 - enrolled in a North Dakota institution of higher education.
 - enrolled in a teacher preparation program.
2. Only two recipients will be named each year -- one from a University and one from a Tribal College.
3. The award will be forwarded to the institution of higher education in which the recipient is enrolled to defer usual and customary expenses for the semester following the award.

Thunderbirds' 2nd semester starts with positive outlook

BISMARCK, N.D. — With the beginning of a new semester, the United Tribes Technical College men's basketball team has a 10-7 record entering conference play.



Albers

"I think we are doing just fine considering the tough schedule we've played in the beginning of the season," said Coach Finley. "These guys have proved they have the heart to play the game at this level."

Seven of the eight players are on either the President's or Vice-President's List. As a team the Thunderbirds have an overall GPA of 3.6.

"That is a statement in itself. I really believe in education before athletics, and this being my first recruiting class, I hope they have set the standard for what our basketball program is all about," said Finley.

"I don't take any credit for their accomplishments in the classroom, but I do push them to get to class and to get their work done."



Lee

As a team, the Thunderbirds lead the nation in scoring at 98 points per game, and Tanner Albers leads the nation in individual scoring at 30 ppg. The UTTC team is ranked second in its region which includes North Dakota, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

Jason Logg is tied for third in scoring in the region at 21 ppg. In the North Dakota Junior College statistics Albers, Jason Logg and Terry Lee are in the top five scoring where Lee gets 19 ppg. Logg and Lee are

also second and third in rebounding at 10 and 9 rpg respectively.

Albers has been a steady performer for the team as he averages 10 ppg, 6 rpg and 3 blocks.

"Travis is our leader. He and Terry are co-captains, and they really do a nice job with the team," the coach said.

Lonnie White Eyes started with the team second semester.

"I really think he is going to add to this team as he has a lot of natural ability and is fundamentally sound."

Delvin Wolf, Fort Berthold, N.D., also joined for the second semester.

He will bring excellent ball handling skills to this team as well as his shooting, passing and ability to penetrate, the coach said.

"He will fit in well with his new teammates."
