#  NATIVE AMERICAN INDIAN TRADITIONAL CODE OF ETHICS 

1. EACH MORNING UP ON RISING, AND EACH EVENING BEFORE SLEEPING, GIVE THANKS FOR THE LIFE WITHIN YOU AND FOR ALL LIFE, FOR GOOD THINGS THE CREATOR HAS GIVEN YOU AND OTHERS FOR THE OPPORTUNITY TO GROW A LITTLE MORE EACH DAY. CONSIDER YOUR THOUGHTS AND ACTIONS OF THE PAST DAY AND SEEK FOR THE COURAGE AND STRENGTH TO BE A BETTER PERSON. SEEK FOR THE THINGS THAT WILL BENEFIT EVERYONE.
2. RESPECT: RESPECT MEANS *TO FEEL OR SHOW HONOR OR ESTEEM FOR SOMEONE OR SOMETHING; TO CONSIDER THE WELL-BEING OF, OR TO TREAT SOMEONE OR SOMETHING WITH DEFERENCE OR COURTESY." SHOWING RESPECT IS A BASIC LAW OF LIFE.
A. TREAT EVERY PERSON, FROMTHE TINIEST CHILD TO THE OLDEST ELDER WITH RESPECT AT ALL TIMES.
B. SPECIAL RESPECT SHOULD BE GIVEN TO ELDERS, PARENTS, TEACHERS AND COMMUNITY LEADERS.
C. NO PERSON SHOULD BE MADE TO FEEL "PUT DOWN" BY YOU; AVOID HURTING OTHER HEARS AS YOU WOULD AVOID A DEADLY POISON.
D. TOUCH NOTHING THAT BELONGS TO SOMEONE ELSE (ESPECIALLY SACRED OBJE(T) WITHOUT PERMISSION OR AN UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN YOU.
E. RESPECT THE PRIVACY OF EVERY PERSON. NEVER INTRUDE ON A PERSONS QUIET MOMENTS OR PERSONAL SPACE.
F. NEVER WALK BETWEEN PEOPLE THAT ARE CONVERSING.
C. NEVER INTERRUPT PEOPLE WHO ARE CONVERSING.
H. SPEAK IN A SOFT VOICE, ESPECIALLY WHEN YOU ARE IN THE PRESENCE OF ELDERS, STRANGERS OR OTHERS TO WHOM SPECIAL RESPECT IS DUE,
3. DO NOT SPEAK UNLESS INVITED TO DO SO AT GATHERINGS WHERE ELDERS ARE PRESENT (EXCEPT TO ASK WHAT IS EXPECTED OF YOU, SHOULD YOU BE IN DOUBT.)
J. NEVER SPEAK ABOUT OTHERS IN A NEGATIVE WAY, WHETHER THEY ARF PRESENT OR NOT.
K. TREAT THE EARTH AND ALL HER ASPECTS AS YOUR MOTHER. SHOW DEEP RESPECT FOR THE MINERAL WORLD, THE PLANT WORLD, AND THE ANIMAL WORLD. DO NOTHING TO POLLUTE OUR MOTHER, RISE UP WITH WISDOM TO DEFEND HER.
L. SHOW DEEP RESPECT FOR THE BELIEFS AND RELIGIONS OF OTHERS.
M. LISTEN WITH COURTESY TO WHAT OTHERS SAY, EVEN IF YOU FEEL THAT WHAT THEY ARE SAYING IS WORTHLESS. LISTEN WITH YOUR HEART.
4. RESPECTTHE WISDOM OF THE PEOPLE INTHE COUNCIL. ONCE YOU GIVE AN IDEA TO A COUNCIL OR A MEETING IT NO LONGER BELONGS TO YOU. IT BELONGS TO THE PEOPLE. RESPECT DEMANDS THAT YOU LISTEN INTENTLY TO THE IDEAS OF OTHERS IN COUNCIL AND THAT YOU DO NOT INSIST THAT YOUR IDEA PREVAILS. INDEED YOU SHOULI

## NATIVE AMERICAN INDIAN TRADITIONAL CODE OF ETHICS (CONTINUED)...

FREELY SUPPORT THE IDEAS OF OTHERS IF THEY ARE TRUE AND GOOD, EVEN IF THOSE IDEAS ARE DIFFERENT FROM THE ONES YOU HAVE CONTRIBUTED. THE CLASH OF IDEAS BRINGS FORTH THE SPARK OF TRUTH.
4. ONCE A COUNCIL HAS DECIDED SOMETHING IN UNITY, RESPECT DEMANDS THAT NO SPEAKS SECRETLY AGAINST WHAT HAS BEEN DECIDED. IF THE COUNCIL HAS MADE AN ERROR, IT WILL BECOME APPARENTTO EVERYONE IN ITS OWN TIME.
5. BE THRUTHFUL AT ALL TIMES, AND UNDER ALL CIRCUMSTANCES.
6. ALWAYS TREAT YOU GUESTS WITH HONOR AND CONSIDERATION. GIVE IF YOUR BEST FOOD, YOUR BEST BLANKETS, THE BEST PART OF YOUR HOUSE, AND YOUR BEST SERVICE TO YOUR GUESTS.
7. THE HURT OF ONE IS THE HURT OF ALL, THE HONOR OF ONE IS THE HONOR OF ALL.
8. RECEIVE STRANGERS AND OUTSIDERS WITH A LOVING HEART AND AS MEMBERS OF THE HUMAN FAMILY.
9. ALL THE RACES AND TRIBES IN THE WORLD ARE LIKE THE DIFFERENT COLORED FLOWERS OF ONE MEADOW. ALL ARE BEAUTIFUL. AS CHILDREN OF THE CREATOR, THEY MUST ALL BE RESPECTED.
10. TO SERVE OTHERS, TO BE OF SOME USE TO FAMILY, COMMUNITY, NATION OR THE WORLD - IS ONE OF THE MAIN PURPOSES FOR WHICH HUMAN BEINGS HAVE BEEN CREATED. DO NOT FILL YOURSELF WITH YOUR OWN AFFAIRS AND FORGET YOUR MOST IMPORTANT TASK. TRUE HAPPINESS COMES ONLY TO THOSE WHO DEDICATE THEIR LIVES TO THE SERVICE OF OTHERS.
11. OBSERVE MODERATION AND BALANCE IN ALL THINGS.
12. KNOW THOSE THINGS THAT LEAD TO YOUR WELL-BEING AND THOSE THINGS THAT LEAD TO YOUR DESTRUCTION.
13. LISTEN TO AND FOLLOW THE GUIDANCE GIVEN TO YOUR HEART. EXPECT GUIDANCE TO COME IN MANY FORMS - IN PRAYER, IN DREAMS, IN TIMES OF QUIET SOLITUDE AND IN THE WORDS AND DEEDS OF WISE ELDERS AND FRIENDS.

## Qualifications:

1. No age limit.
2. Must be enrolled ( 6 or more credits) in a tribally-controlled community college.
3. Must be maintaining a grade point average of 2.0 (C) or better.
4. Must possess knowledge of tribal traditions.

## Criteria:

1. Student must be nominated by a college employee (employee must submit a nomination form along with proof of college enrollment).
2. Student must submit an essay answering the question "How has attending a tribal college changed your life?" (200-500 words).
3. Student must submit two (2) letters of recommendation from sources who are familiar with his or her tribal knowledge/contributions. These letters should be from someone other than the college president.
4. Student must submit a personal profile.
5. Student must be available for a private interview during the AIHEC Conference.
