Three Affiliated Tribes host visit by the closest living descendant of famed explorer and early ecologist,

New Town, ND, September 25, 1997: On Friday, October 3, Prince Wilhelm of Neu Wied, Germany, will arrive in Bismarck on the first leg of a 10-day trip that retraces the travels of his greatgrand uncle, Price Maximillan, who wintered with the Mandan-Hidatsa tribes in 1883-84.

• The event is sponsored by the Three Affiliated Tribes and by All Nations Lifeways Village, an Indian-operated non-profit community development entity being organized in Mandan with a satellite office in Mandaree. The Prince will participate in ribbon cutting ceremonies at the new community center in Mandaree.

· German Prince Maximillan and Swiss artist Karl Bodmer observed and recorded the lifeways of the Missouri River tribes and the native ecological balance of the region. Prince Fredrich Wilhelm is the closest living descendant of Price Maximillan and lives in the family castle along the Rhein River in Bonn, Germany.

• The Prince's itinerary will include several regional historical sites in the Bismarck area including: Fort Union, Knife River Villages, Fort Lincoln/Slant Village, Heritage Center, United Tribes Technical College (UTTC), the Three Tribes Museum in Four Bears and several schools on the Fort Berthold reservation. He will meet with the Tribal Council, with tribal elders, and with groups of school children. The school meeting will mark the beginning of an interactive cultural exchange, using distance learning technologies, between the Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Tribal Nation and the Nation of Germany.

• The week long event will conclude with a traditional powwow and feast. Planning for this event began about two years ago when Tex Hall, then Superintendent of the Mandaree School, and Sandy Poitra, Cultural Director of UTTC were invited to Germany to highlight a trade show in Bonn to talk about "American Indian Visioning and Valuing".

· Hall, who is now the Three Affiliated Council Representative for the Mandaree area said, "What a leap forward for our tribe to host International guests of this stature and to begin renewing our history as a trading center for Native Peoples in this country and with the Euro-Americans in Nation to Nation dialogue. This event is the first step to new opportunities."

• Other hosted guests from Germany include a marketing representative and technology consultant to assist in mutual planning and future events.



October 10 is nationally recognized as "Turn Off the Violence Day". The following is an excerpt from the AIDS Newslink newsletter dated Spring 1997.

Every year in the U.S., three to four million women are battered or abused. Many women are the victims of violence attributed to childhood sexual abuse, rape or physical and emotional domestic abuse. One in three girls is sexually abuse by the age of 18, often by someone in her intimate circle of family and friends. Nearly one-third of women killed annually die as a result of violent acts by current or former partners or spouses.

Violence against women has reached near epidemic proportions in the United States of the same time that HIV infection is increasing most rapidly among women, especially women of color. This dual epidemic requires that health care providers understand how violence can underlie behaviors that put women at risk for HIV infection and how it can impact a woman's decision about disclosing her HIV status. Many HIV care providers are unaware of the violent episodes that affect or have affected the lives of the women they serve. The importance of assessing and intervening is highlighted by a recent large perspective study that suggested the higher mortality rate among HIV-infected women participants might be related to "lower socioeconomic status, homelessness, domestic abuse, substance abuse, and the lack of social support."


