Brookings, S.D. - Sicangu Lakota educator Phil Baird was named one of the distinguished alumni honorees at South Dakota State University this Fall. He received the 1997 Service to Education award.

Much of Phil's professional activities have focused the past 20 years on the education of American Indian people. He presently is the executive director of the North Dakota Association of Tribal Colleges (NDATC). He is also the associate director of Tribal land grant programs at United Tribes Technical College in Bismarck.


