Monday afternoon, November 8, became a genuine COMMUNITY OF LEARNERS concerning Aids.


Students, staff, faculty and administration are to be commended for their participation in the Aid Awareness Day activities.

Family Chemical Awareness Group

A Family Chemical Awareness Group is starting up. The first meeting will be held on Saturday, November 20, at 3:00 p.m., at the Chemical Health Center, Building 68. Topic: Alcohol vs. Self-Esteem. Come and meet the new counselor.

Native American Substance Abuse

The statistics cited below were obtained from the INDIAN YOUTH SUBSTANCE ABUSE PRE-VENTION ACT (HR-1156):

1. Alcohol-related health problems among Native Americans are 9.2 times higher than that of the neneral U.S. population.

2. One-third (1/3) of all Indian youth have used alcohol with some frequency by the age of eleven (11).

3. Statistics revealed that Indian youth are two (2) times more likely to commit suicide than the general U.S. population and eighty-percent (80%) of these are alcohol-related.

4. Indian youth are twice as likely as the general population to die in automobile accidents. Seventy-five percent (75%) of these are alcohol-related.

5. The abuse of alcohol by pregnant women has created drastic increases of Fetal Alcohol Syndrome among newborn Indians. On some reservations FAS may occur as frequently as one in onehundred births. Whereas, its occurence in the non-Indian population is one in seven-hundred births.

Additional information regarding the effects of alcohol on the Native American life-style is taken from a report on: "PREVENTING SUBSTANCE ABUSE WITH INDIAN YOUTH." There findings indicated:

1. Terminal liver cirrhosis occurs 14.5 times more often among the Indian than among non-Indians for 25-34 year-olds.

2. Traffic fatalities for American Indians, many of which involve alcohol, happen at a rate of 3.2 times more frequently than that of the national average. 3. Drug and alcohol influenced crimes for American Indian people are 8 times more frequent than blacks and 20 times more frequent than white Americans.

 As many as eighty-six percent (86%) of the suicides among Indian people involve alcohol/drugs.
Data collected from large prisons reports indicated that "among the Indians convicted of homicide, the homicidal act WAS ALWAYS ALCOHOL-RELATED.


The "Say No" Club will Bingo or Bust, Thursday, (11/18) evening from 6-8:30 p.m. in the small gym.


