Thirteenth Annual Conference on Indian Education March 27-30, 1994 Radisson Inn, Bismarck, ND COLLEGE STUDENT OF THE YEAR AWARD NOMINATION CRITERIA

To be considered for one of twenty nine AIHEC "College Students of the Year" awards Tribal college student candidates must.

1. Be enrolled as a full-time student by his/her institution.

2. Have maintained a minimum of a cumulative 3.25 grade point average (GPA) with a written verification provided by the college's registrar.

3. Submit written nominations with at least two (20 letters of recommendation by college administrators, faculty, and/or by local student services personnel and student organizational representative.

Selection of the student recipients will be based upon:

- Degree of participation in local student organizations, clubs, and extra-curricular activities.

- Involvement in other Tribal college events and institution activities.

- Level of involvement with reservation communities and Tribal organization on a volunteer basis.

- Achievement of personal and professional goals.

- Types of achievement and recognition honors.

Complete Tribal college student award nominations will include:

a. Nomination with appropriate information.

b. Two (20 letters of recommendation.

c. Written verification of student status and cumulative GPA verified by the College registrar.

d. Any other supporting documentation, as appropriate.

ear Awards Review and Recommendations PURPOSE:

To award one outstanding student from each of the 29 Indian colleges.

To create an initiative for student excellence. CRITERIA FOR THE AWARDS:

Grade Point Average

Each institution shall determine for itself how many credits a student must carry in order to be eligible for the award.

Community Service and Volunteer Work

Financial Need

PROCEDURE:

The Student Congress of each instituion shall elect a selection committee consisting of one student, one faculty member and one prominent individual from the community.

Award applications will be made available to all students. The completed applications must be submitted to the Selection Committee at each college's own campus for review no later than four weeks prior to the spring AIHEC Conference.

Each institution's Section Committee shall then choose 3 student candidates to send to an AIHEC ad hoc committee. The applications of the 3 students must be in the AICF office 2 weeks before the AIHEC Conference which begins March 27, 1994. The AIHEC ad hoc committee shall consist of the Student Congress advisors and on AICF representative.

The ad hoc committee will make the final selection of the top 29 students.

From among the 29 winners, one student will be chosen as tanding and presented with a ceremonial award in accordance with the traditions of the tribe(s) hosting the AIHEC conference. There will be no monetary value to the outstanding student award.

The ad hoc committee will make the announcement of the winners at the AIHEC Spring Conference (The AIHEC Student Congress Awards Luncheon).

## **Goods News for Peter Roemmick**


