# Do you or someone you love have a Gambling Problem?

Many Americans gamble. Recent studies indicate that somewhere between 70 to 80 percent of Americans at one time or another engage in some form of gambling. Today gambling is a way of life. It is supported by our state government and encouraged in the media. It is accepted by many people as a normal recreational activity and for many that's exactly what it is.

However, for a good number of people, estimated to be about 3% to 5% of those who gamble it can be deadly. It has devastating effects on them emotionally, financially, socially and spiritually. And in some cases it can impact one's physical health.

Gambling also takes its toll on the important people in the gambler's life; spouses, parents, children, friends and employers. All too frequently theses extreme social costs are over-looked by society as a whole.

Compulsive gambling is a progressive disease with three distinct phases. The Winning Phase, Losing Phase, and the Desperate Phase.

The Winning Phase is often fun for the gambler and for his/her family and friends as well who are sometimes beneficiaries of the rewards of the gambler when there is "a big win." In this phas gambling increases in both frequency and ever increasing amounts of money being wagered. Once he or she starts gambling compulsively the losing phase will begin.

In the Losing Phase losses become considerably greater than winnings. In this phase personal finances and household funds are spent with abandonment as the compulsive gambler "chases his/losses," As losses increase so does the lying, deception, illegal and legal borrowing from friends, banks, credit cards, etc., writing bad checks and real property to finance gambling. Families are hurt, friends who loan money without repayment turn away. Trust is totally destroyed.

The Desperate Phase begins when the gambler spends nearly every waking moment scheming about ways to raise money to support his/her gambling. Frustration, anger, and fear takes over the life of the gambler and the family members. Often the behavior of the gamblers family becomes as bizarre as his/her own behavior.

No matter what action the family takes, the gambler is passionately consumed with the desire to gamble--it is no longer a choice-it is an all consuming compulsion to gamble--to catch the big win.

The only solution is treatment. Compulsive gambling is a treatable disease. However, the compulsive gambler is most generally in severe denial and he or she does not recognize the severity or seriousness of their disease. Others recognize the need for help, but not the compulsive gambler. Many if not most family members have little understanding of the compulsive gambler and are frustrated in their well-intentioned efforts to get the compulsive gambler to stop gambling.
