Gipp named Indian educator of the year

TUCSON, Ariz. - The National Indian Education Association selected David M. Gipp as its 1995 Educator of the Year at its 26th annual conference here on Nov. 14.

Mr. Gipp, who has served as president of the United Tribes Technical College in Bismarck, ND, since May 2, 1977, was cited for his contribution in fostering tribally controlled higher education.

He is a member of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe located in North Dakota and South Dakota and is originally from Fort Yates, ND.

The award is made to an outstanding member of NIEA each year. He received the award for his contributions in improving Indian education.

"I am proud and humbled to be selected as this year's NIEA Educator of the Year," Mr. Gipp said. "It's extra special since I am following in my brother Gerry's footsteps in receiving this award."

Mr. Gipp was instrumental in fostering the passage of the first tribally controlled college law when it was signed by President Jimmy Carter in 1978.

He served as the first permanent executive director of the American Indian Higher Education Consortium from 1973 to 1977 when there was only a handful of tribally controlled colleges.

He worked extensively with tribal communities and the U.S. Congress promoting the proposed new law to assist tribal colleges when neither state nor private aid existed.

An advocate of tribal rights and empowerment through education, he has worked on a number of federal laws and policies which provide educational opportunities for tribal populations.

Mr. Gipp is one of three brothers who are professional educators. Dr. Gerald Gipp was named NIEA Educator of the Year in 1984. Their oldest brother Robert is a retired teacher and ranches north of Fort Yates. Robert was designated the North Dakota Indian Education Association Educator of the Year in the early 1980's.

Mr. Gipp is the son of Margaret Halsey Teachout of Fort Yates. His Indian name is Lone Star.

THUNDERBIRDS OPEN SEASON IN MONTANA

The UTTC Men's basketball team opened their season November 2, 3 and 4, 1995 on the road in the tip-off classic in Miles City Montana. First up was Western Wyoming, "we played with these guys right down to the wire" said coach Finley, "Geno and Marcus fouled out in crunch time and we couldn't match-up with their size and they took over." Miles City was next, with 2:00 remaining Miles City was up by 2 points, "Again, Geno Fouled out and Sonny cramped up. "Geno fouling out is no excuse for our losses but to lose your center down the stretch makes things tougher for the shooters because now there isn't that inside threat and the defense can cheat out a little more." UTTC finally got on track as they defeated Medicine Hat college of Canada, "I was pleased with the guy's effort here, it was our 4th game in 4 days and it showed, yet our guys fought hard all the way to the end." November 16, 17 and 18 marked the "Thunderbird Classic" "we were scheduled to have Bismarck State, Briercrest Canada and Haskell here but due to the temporary Government shutdown Haskell lost some funding and their athletic department was affected so they couldn't come," some amateur teams were scheduled at the last minute as Haskell pulling out cause Briercrest to change their minds. The Thunderbirds lost all three games to good teams and it was not a good showing. 

North Dakota Interactive Video Network

The North Dakota Interactive Video Network (ND IVN) has finally arrived at United Tribes Technical College. The IVN classroom is located at the Skills Center, Rm 112 and can seat 18 comfortably. Here is a brief description of what the North Dakota Interactive Video Network is all about.

The North Dakota Interactive Video Network (ND IVN) is dedicated to support of Distance Education in North Dakota. The ND IVN mission is to "deliver quality postsecondary programs and services to citizens who would not otherwise have access to those services. University credit courses have first priority for scheduling; however, the system may also be used for noncredit workshops, conferences, and meetings.

The ND IVN is supported by the North Dakota University System and the North Dakota Information Services Division. The Network includes 28 classrooms and conference rooms at 11 North Dakota University Systems Campuses, five Tribal Colleges, the State Capital, and the North Dakota State Hospital, plus connections with several high schools in North Dakota.

The system utilizes TV cameras, monitors, microphones and other telecommunications equipment to transmit live audio and video between two or more locations. Instruction and presentation can be made from any site, and participants at all sites are able to see and hear each other. Multiple events can be conducted simultaneously utilizing different classrooms.







A special thank you to staff & students who participated in the World AIDS Day activities on Friday, December 1, 1995. We hope that you learned more about the AIDS epidemic and enjoyed the skit that was put on by students & staff (Applause! Applause!). We hope to see you all again next year at the same time.

In recent months, quite a number of students have failed to return their clinic authorization slips after being examined by a physician $(1/2 \text{ white sheet of pa$ $per})$. Students MUST return this authorization slip in order for the student's medical file to be completed. Failure to do so may result in your medical bill not getting paid.

Also, those students who are in need of an eye exam or dental work, please made arrangements with your home agency to get the needed appointment scheduled over the Christmas break.

The annual blood sugar & cholesterol screening was held on November 16, 1995. There were 44 students and staff who participated in the screening (21 staff & 23 students).

These are the guidelines that were used: Blood Glucose - 80-120 Cholesterol - <200 desirable cholesterol level 200-239 - borderline cholesterol level 240> high blood cholesterol

THUNDERBIRDS LOSE

On November 21, 1995 the UTTC "Thunderbirds" traveled to UND-Lake Region in Devils Lake for their second conference game, the Royals jumped out to a 24-3 lead and never looked back and ended up winning the game by a score of 103-76. "We were coming off of a 3 game losing streak at home and we were just flat-out out played, I don't think the team understands yet that playing this game at this level takes a high degree of mental toughness and the importance of being physically capable of playing the game, you must be in tip-top physical condition to be at the top of your game and the off the court things should be put aside by EVERYONE if we are going to be successful, this team is full of potential but we have yet to put together 40 solid minutes of team basketball." December 1 & 2, 1995 marked the "Can-Am Classic" in Williston ND. UTTC's first round opponent was NDSU-Bottineau, a team which UTTC handled guit easily on their home court earlier this season, "these guys were coming into the tournament on a 6 game winning streak so I knew we had to be mentally prepared for them, they shoot the ball well and run the floor as good as anyone, we played the first half right with them as the half ended 37-35 NDSU-Bottineau. "We had a few let downs to start the second half and they took advantage of them and quit playing" said coach Finley, NDSU-Bottineau won the game 94-68. UND-Williston was next and again the "Thunderbirds" came out and played an excellent first half with the same results in the second half as the "Thunderbirds" ended up getting beat by a score of 111-68 "UND-Williston is the best team we've faced so far this season, they play team basketball and they play it well. "No matter what it is a person is attempting to accomplish in life, if you quit or let up for even one minute you are going to suffer set backs, being able to understand the lessons of failure and the ability to overcome those set backs are the keys to success" says coach Finley. The Thunderbirds play Bismarck State College tonight (Monday) at BSC at 7:30 pm, "We are in need of a win to regain our confidence in each other, but most of all we need you, the fans and your support. Children & It's as easy AIR BAGS as 1 - 2 - 3



Never put a rear-facing child seat (those used with infants) in the front seat of a car with an air bag.



Make sure all children are buckled up no matter where they sit. Unbuckled children can be hurt or killed by an air bag.



The rear seat is the safest place for children of any age to ride.



Children & Air Bags

What's the Problem?

- Most new cars have air bags for front-seat passengers. When used with lap/shoulder belts, air bags work very well to protect older children and adults who ride facing the front of the car.
- ⇒ Air bags do not work with rear-facing child seats (those used with infants).
- Airbags could seriously injure or even kill an unbuckled child or adult who is sitting too close to the air bag or who is thrown toward the dash during emergency braking.
- In a crash, the air bag inflates very quickly. It could hit anything close to the dashboard with enough force to cause severe injuries or even death. Because the back of a rear-facing child seat sits very close to the dashboard, the seat could be struck with enough force to cause serious, or even fatal injuries to a baby.
- Even older childen (who have outgrown child seats) are at risk from a deploying air bag, if they are not properly restrained with a lap/shoulder belt.

What Should I Do?

- ⇒ The rear seat is the safest place for children of any age to ride.
- An infant in a rear-facing child seat must ride in the back seat if your vehicle has a passenger side air bag (babies under 1 year and 20 pounds should always ride in a rear-facing seat).
- Make sure that everyone in the front seat is properly buckled up and seated as far back from the air bags as is reasonably possible.
- Make sure that all young children are properly secured in a child safety seat and older children by a lap/shoulder belt. Know how to properly install your child seat in the vehicle. Read both the owner's manual for the vehicle and the instructions for your child safety seat.
