Will never know why.





"LIVING THE DREAM: LET FREEDOM RING!" Celebration Honors Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. on January 16, 1989 at the North Dakota Heritage Center

U.T.T.C. STAFF MEMBERS WERE AN IMORTANT PART OF THIS ANNUAL EVENT

On January 11, 1989, two administrators from United Tribes Technical College, MR. DAVID GIPP and MR. EDWARD JOHNSON, were among the planners of the celebration held at the North Dakota Heritage Center in Bismarck to honor the memory of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. on Dr. King's Holiday. The program, entitled, "LIVING THE DREAM: LET FREEDOM RING!" was sponsored by the North Dakota Commission on Martin Luther King, Jr. Holiday. The Commission Chairperson is Audrey J. Henderson-Nocho, University of North Dakota, Grand Forks, and the Vice-Chairperson is the Reverend Lionel P. A. Muthiah, United Methodist Church, Linton. Members of the Commission include Mr. Gipp and Mr. Johnson.

The North Dakota Commission on the Martin Luther King, Jr. Holiday was established in 1985 by Governor George Sinner to encourage North Dakotans to explore creative and meaningful ways to observe this new national and state holiday. Since 1986, the "Martin Luther King, Jr. Holiday Award" has been presented to North Dakotans to recognize special achievements of citizens. In 1986, the Award was presented to Judge Ron Davies of Fargo. The second annual Award was presented to Tillie Walker of Mandaree in 1987. Former Lt. Governor Ruth Meier received the award in 1988. This year's January 1989 Award was presented to Dr. John R. Salter, Jr., for his work on civil rights in North Dakota for Native Amerians and for all people of the state whose rights need recognition.

In Dr. Salter's words......"HUMAN RIGHTS---a full measure of food, freedom, dignity, and spiritual well-being---are rights which come directly from the Creator. But people---all people of good will, regardless of racial and cultural background---MUST COME TOGETHER TO WORK VIGOROUSLY AND SENSIBLY TO SECURE AND MAINTAIN THOSE RIGHTS. And they must always be cognizant that 'an injury to one is an injury to all.' When we do that---when we organize and work together---we reach high, toward the sun, and we build things which can never be taken away from us."

The celebration honoring Dr. King included remarks by Miss Bobette Kay Wildcat, Miss Indian America XXXIII and a Pipe Ceremony during the Invocation. The N. D. Martin Luther King, Jr. Holiday Award was presented by Governor George A. Sinner to Dr. Salter.

Following the celebration, a reception was held for the many people who participated in and who attended the event.

Refreshments (coffee and a large assortment of "goodies") were provided by UNITED TRIBES TECHNICAL COLLEGE.

At this time, the NEWSLETTER would like to acknowledge the people at United Tribes who are often called upon to contribute their special skills to make an event like the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Celebration a success. These are people whose names do not appear on the programs, but who are in the "background", working hard to make things go smoothly. Before the "LIVING THE DREAM: LET FREEDOM RING!" Celebration at the Heritage Center, United Tribes Security transported the large commercial-type coffee servers, the cups and napkins, and the trays of cakes, cookies, brownies, and other assorted sweets to the Capital from U.T.T.C. And the unsung heroine at U.T.T.C. who deserves all the credit for making those many trays of treats was ROSE PAPKE, one of the ladies who works in the United Tribes Cafeteria. 

UNITED TRIBES TECHNICAL COLLEGE BOARD MEMBER ADDRESSES THE NORTH DAKOTA STATE LEGISLATURE

On January 6, 1989, the Honorable Edward Lone Fight, Tribal Chairman for the Three Affiliated Tribes on the Ft. Berthold Reservation, New Town, North Dakota, presented the Third Annual STATE OF THE RELATIONSHIP MESSAGE to the North Dakota State Senate and the North Dakota House of Representatives.

The Reception that followed Mr. Lone Fight's address was co-hosted by United

Tribes Technical College, and the North Dakota Indian Affairs Commission.

The "State of the Relationship" message is a tribal perspective about the interaction between the State of North Dakota and the Indian Tribal Governments operating within the state. When Mr. Lone Fight entered each the Senate Chambers and the House of Representatives, he was accorded the respect of a leader of a sovereign nation...which is what each tribe of Indians is in this country. Mr. Lone Fight was escorted to the podium in each area of the legislature, and his speeches, delivered separately to the Senate and to the House, were preceded by the Indian Flag ceremonial song, sung by Drum and Singers from Mandaree.

In his speeches to the North Dakota State Senate and the North Dakota State Legislature, Mr. Lone Fight discussed the rates of unemployment on the reservations in North Dakota, the desire for economic and educational opportunities shared by people on the reservations, and the economic conditions that "...exist on North Dakota's Indian reservations (that) shock the conscience". Mr. Lone Fight emphasized the need for the Legislators and the Tribal Leaders in the State to work together to solve the problems of the Indian citizens of North Dakota. "It is imperative," he said, "that the Indian tribes and the state work closer together to forge a future that will meet the needs of our children, while maintaining the integrity and family values which have proven to be he strength of all North Dakotans." Mr. Lone Fight cited chances for economic growth for the Indian tribes in the areas of tourism and the Garrison Diversion Project.

Other areas that Mr. Lone Fight cited the need for cooperation between state

and reservations were in the areas of health care and land management.

United Tribes faculty, staff, and students attended the STATE OF THE RELATIONSHIP addresses.

Before Mr. Lone Fight was scheduled to address the North Dakota State Legislature, he was the guest speaker in three of instructor Mary Lemcke's English classes. Mr. Lone Fight discussed his speech with the students, and also addressed them on other issues. The Tribal Chairman invited questions from the students. This opportunity for the students to meet Mr. Lone Fight before his address made the Chairman's appearance before the Legislature all the more relevant to the students.

After Mr. Lone Fight's speeches, a large reception was held between 2:30-3:30 PM in the Grand Hall outside the Senate and House. UTTC students and staff mingled with state senators and representatives, and Mr. Lone Fight spent over an hour answering questions

and visiting with students and staff.

The reception coffee and cakes, brownies, cookies, etc. were served by UTTC Food Service Instructor PAM CARLASCIO and UTTC Cafeteria chef, AL STOCKERT. The trays of goodies were made by ROSE PAPKE. After the VIP's, the students, guests, and UTTC faculty/staff

enjoyed the reception together, only crumbs remained!
