
Gerard shared much of his culture, his respect for elders, his experiences about traditional ways, etc. with the students. His presentation was illustrated with displays of buffalo hides, coyote and other animal pelts, horns, and Missouri River

flint pieces, as well as other "hands-on" artifacts.

During the presentation, the listeners were able to visualize much of past and present North Dakota Indian culture. Gerard spoke of eagle-catching lodges, which are still evident on the reservation lands, if one is able to recognize them.
