This week's DID YOU KNOW column is about the President of United Tribes Technical College, DAVID GIPP.

"DID YOU KNOW?" that when the United Tribes International Powwow's opening celebration honored the employees of the school's 20 years of existence, Mr. Gipp deliberately left his own name off the list of employees called to the front of the audience to be recognized for their years of service? He has been here for 12 consecutive years, but this is not counting the time before he was hired as Executive Director of what was THEN United Tribes Educational Technical Center. Now, Mr. Gipp is the President of United Tribes Technical College. Did you know that Mr. Gipp's brother is the President of Haskell in Kansas? And did you know that when Dave was attending the University of North Dakota in Grand Forks, North Dakota, that he co-founded the UND Indian Association? Among the other organizers were Twila Martin-Kekahbah, now the Chairperson at Turtle Mountain and Carl McKay, Tribal Chairman of Fort Totten. Dave was the first president of the UND Indian Association. The new association worked with Indian values, financial aid, student involvement, and cultural awareness. They also wanted Indian history to be taught in history courses. In 1989-1990, a new Native American curriculum will be introduced in public schools in North Dakota.

In 1969, Mr. Gipp and his small group of Indian students got together with UND's Senate Activities Committee, and that year's "Time Out" theme became "Indian Problems Today or Racism North Dakota Style". In 20 years, the Indian theme has been carried out into the annual spring "Time Out"/Wacipi. (In April of 1989, several students from UTTC attended the UND TIME OUT/WACIPI Authors' Forum to hear N. Scott Momaday and William Least Heat Moon discuss their books; the Authors' Forum was an English assignment/follow-up to the students' having read those authors' works.)

And "DID YOU KNOW" that Dave Gipp was the first executive director of the American Indian Higher Education Consortium? In that position, he had a hand in writing the Tribal Community College Act, which became law in 1978, and he guided the early growth of the nation's tribal community college movement. When Dave came to UTTC in 1977, one of his first actions was to put its accreditation into motion.

The first United Tribes Technical College Indian Art Expo/Market, held in conjunction with the September powwow, proved to be a success for the artists and visitors.

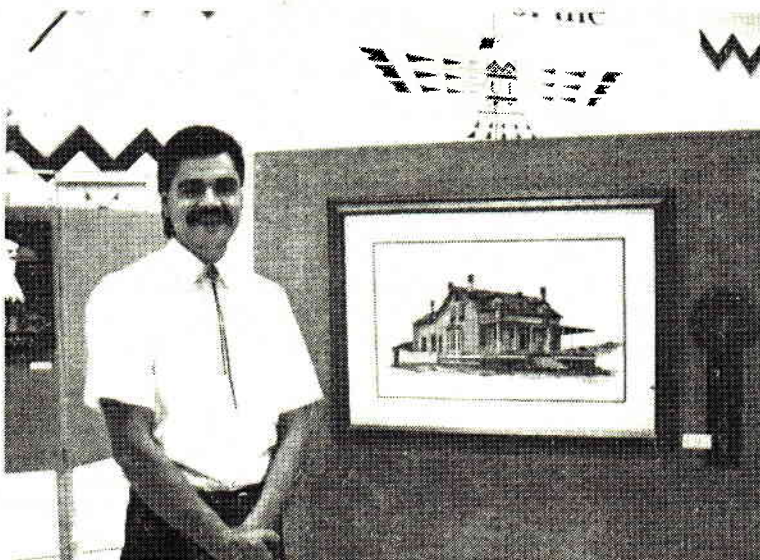
