The Northern Plains Resource and Evaluation Center is one of the five regional centers established in the United States to provide training and technical assistance to Indian Education Act (IEA-TITLE IV) grantees and programs serving American Indian/Alaskan Native students. The Center is administered under a federal contract with the U. S. Department of Education.

Operated since 1981 on the UTTC campus, the Resource Center has a priority function to assist education programs with strengthening capacities to evaluate the effectiveness of programs serving Indian students. Technical assistance and training areas include: Program Design, Management, and Evaluation, along with specialized areas such as Curriculum Development, Student Self-Esteem, Home-School Relations, and Leadership Development. Service activities include workshops, on-site consultations, conference presentations, information dissemination, and professional consultant support services.

The Northern Plains Resource and Evaluation Center serves educational programs and organizations in the states of Iowa, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Wyoming. The Center's services are provided upon written request AT NO COST TO THE SCHOOL requesting the services.

The current RECII Director is Phil Baird. His professional colleagues are: Jack Tobias, Evaluation Specialist; Belva Morrison, Education Generalist; three Education Program Specialists: Carole Anne Heart, Muhammad Ndaula, and Andy Rendon.

The Resource Center is located in UTTC Building #35, situated on the southeast corner of the All Nations Circle.

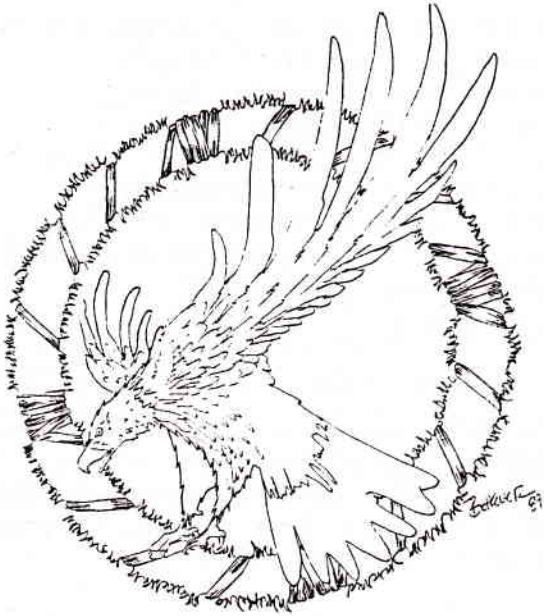
Dr. Muhammad Ndaula has come to United Tribes this year after living and working for seven years at the Standing Rock Community College in Ft. Yates.

HERE'S A "DID YOU KNOW?" STATISTIC that was recently published by the U. S. Department of Labor: WOMEN EARN 67¢ for every \$1.00 that men earn in the United States! BUT two-thirds of American working women are EITHER THE SOLE SUPPORT OF THEIR FAMILIES or their husbands earn LESS than \$15,000.00 per year.

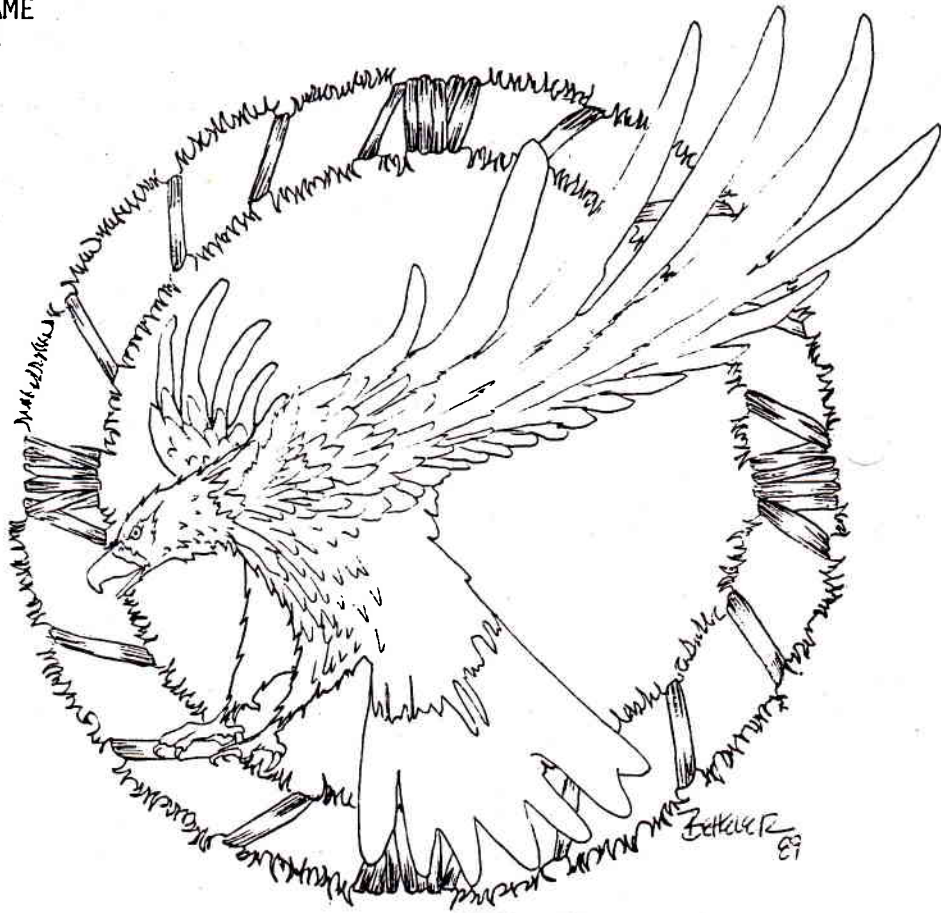
Here are some other interesting and not-so-positive statistics on working women in the U.S.:

1. The number of families with TWO wage earners increased from 44% of the population in 1976 to 54% in 1986.
2. 10% of all women will never marry, and will have to support themselves.
3. 10% of all women will become widows before age 50.
4. 30% of women will become divorced, and have to provide for themselves and their children.
5. 40% of all women will be married and in the paid labor force at least 25 years.
6. 10% of women will be married and not work.

So, 70% of all women will be in the work force; these women do 90% of the housework and child care, and bring home only one-third of the household income!
