King holiday will feature new symbol

The Martin Luther King Jr. Holiday Celebration, now in its sixth year in North Dakota, will feature a new symbol for the annual award presented to the state citizen who best exemplifies ideals set forth by King.

The recipient this year is Brian Palecek of Bismarck.

The North Dakota commission on the King holiday has employed Loveland, Colo., sculptor Hank Smith to create a bronze sculpture of the award. In previous years, the recipients received plaques.

A clay model of the bronze sculpture will be unveiled during the two-day celebration Sunday and Monday. Although the design will remain a secret until then, commission chairman Audrey Henderson-Nocho of Grand Forks says: "When you see it, I think you'll understand why we chose it."

Smith will be present at the ceremonies and will speak about the impact King has made on him. He says that King, Jesus Christ and his mother have been his role models in life. Smith, a black man, says even though he experienced poverty and prejudice as a child, he "grew up in a family where we were not allowed to be prejudiced. We were told to find a way in our mind to overcome this."

"I guess they (the committee) felt: Here's a person whose life is what it is because of his love for Dr. King," Smith says.

Palecek also considers King to be an important role model and a symbol of people who are "willing to give their all for something," he said.

Palecek says it's an honor to feel the committee sees a link between the way he's lived his life and the life of Martin Luther King. He says with the committee's recognition, he's reaping the harvest of years of work.

"It's always nice to have my work recognized," says Palecek, who says he's spent most of his life working on issues of peace, justice, racial equality, sexism, abuse, freedom of expression and censorship.

The ceremony will begin at 7 p.m. in the Heritage Center.
