







David Gipp, president of United Tribes Technical College in Bis-marck, was elected president of the board of directors of the American Indian Higher Education Con-sortium at its

annual meeting

in Omaha, Neb. AIHEC is an international organization

composed of 28 tribally con-trolled institu-tions of higher education in the United States and Canada. The consortium serves as their major focal

point for areas of common interest and concern.

Recently, the consortium has been active in telecommunication, curriculum development and fund

Gipp served as executive director of AIHEC from 1973 to 1977 when he left to assume the presidency at United Tribes. He served as president of the board in 1979 and 1980. Under his leadership, AIHEC was instrumental in securing federal legislation to provide a stable funding base for tribal institutions.

Gipp said his emphasis will be to focus on student opportunities and higher education policy development.

Joann Hetzel was active in many civic groups and organizations.



Joann G. Link was born Feb. 18. 1950 at Williston, the daughter of Arthur and Grace Link. She was raised and educated in the Alexander area, graduating with honors from the Alexander High School in 1968. She attended North Dakota State University in Fargo, and received a B.S. in home economics in 1972. Following graduation, she moved to Towner, where she was Extension home economist for McHenry County. On Oct. 12, 1974, she married Glenn Hetzel in Bismarck. Following their marriage, them moved to Keldron, S.D., where they owned and operated the H&H Angus Ranch. They lived there until 1986 when they moved to Kansas and ranched for two years, until moving to Bismarck in 1988. Joann was an instructor at the United Tribes Technical College from 1988 until December of 1989, where she taught food service skills. In addition to her work keeping the records for the H&H Ranch, she became the Burleigh County Extension home economist.

Through her work she has been able to spend a great deal of time on youth projects, as well as spending time with many homemaker groups. She was a member of the American Home Economics Association, Home Economics for Healthy Living in the Dakotas, American Angus Auxiliary, North Dakota Angus Auxiliary, of which she was a past president, North Dakota Cattle Women, L-7 Cowbelles, of which she was both a past secretary and president. She was also active in the communities in which she lived, as well as being a member of the First Presbyterian Church in Bismarck, Hope Presbyterian Church, located on their ranch in Keldron, the Corson County, S.D., Fair Board, and the Extension Homemakers in Corson County of which the ways a member of the correct of the correct property of the cor County, of which she was a member for more than 12 years, and a past president, a 4H club leader in Corson County, and she served on the Board of Directors, and the membership committee of the Bismarck Welcome Wagon.

Building 1A Conference Center

When planning your UTTC small meetings or special events, consider using the newest meeting place at Tribes - 1A.

Building 1A, which will be named by the Board of Directors at their November meeting, does not replace any of the favorite meeting places already available.

Consider 1A if your meeting or event would be enhanced by the quiet, old Victorian house type setting. 1A is currently able to hold sit down meetings for up to 15, or walk around receptions for twice that number.

1A is available for evening and weekend events as well as 8-5 on weekdays.

TO RESERVE 1A:

- 1) At least one (1) day notice is required.

 Book through Elsie Dionne at Switchboard, Administration Building. No "BUMPING" allowed.

 Once your event is scheduled, you can be assured it is locked in.
- 2) Sign out 1A key at the switchboard at the time of your meeting.

It is anticipated that 1A will be used for meetings where non-UTTC groups will be invited.

Only UTTC Board, UTTC Staff and UTTC Student Senate Officers (V.I.C.A. Chapter Officers, etc.) may sign out the key, and will host these events.

Signing in and out of key will be needed 8-5 weekdays only. It will be opened for your evening or weekend events by your prior reservation.
