





The Johnson O'Malley Indian education program in Bismarck has received a top honor from the Bureau of Indian Affairs Office of Indian Education in Washington.

The award was given to the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe and lo-cal JOM coordinator Anita Charging-Baird of the Bismarck public schools. Charging-Baird accepted the award at the National Indian Education Association convention in Omaha, Neb. Oct. 29.

Charging-Baird and Standing Rock representative Robert Gipp were also honored at a recent meeting of the Bismarck School Board.

"We do a lot of cultural presentations in the schools. We have discussion groups on the junior senior high level and counsel elementary students one-on-one. We maintain a library of American Indian materials for teachers and parents to check out, and we sponsor kids to attend leadership conferences and science fairs," she said.


