

Some information about Ms. Dunn is listed in the following article:





### Secondhand Smoke is Dangerous

Secondhand smoke can be just as dangerous as smoking. Experts rank secondhand smoke as the third leading cause of preventable deaths. Only active smoking and alcohol rank higher.

Between 46,000 and 54,500 nonsmoking Americans die each year from secondhand smoke. Byproducts from nicotine can be detected in nonsmokers.

Side stream smoke that comes off the burning end of a cigarette, contains higher amounts of the compounds that cause cancer and heart disease than what the smoker inhales. Although these particles are smaller in secondhand smoke, they settle in the nonsmokers lungs and it takes longer for them to be cleared from the body.

Children that are exposed to secondhand smoke have a wide range of respiratory disorders and they have a greater risk of cancer and heart disease later in life.
