In the fall of 1991, United Tribes Technical College began offering a new program for degrees and for certificates in EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION. This is called: THE EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION/CHILD DEVELOPMENT DEGREE PROGRAM. The Director of this new program is SHARI OLSON. (EXT. 339)

There are several students enrolled in this new vocation, and several of them have made very important contributions to this NEWSLETTER. Some of their thoughts follow in this feature on the children at UTTC and the programs available for them at United Tribes.

Other articles incorporated into this feature of the NEWSLETTER are articles that Ms. Olson has contributed for the interest of the readers of the NEWSLETTER. The Editor wishes to thank Ms. Olson for her valuable contributions to this issue.

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At the beginning of this academic year (1991-92), Ms. Olson attended a conference at which MR. RAY MCGEE, MSW, ACSW, Lic. SW, was one of the featured presentors. Mr. McGee is a social worker in Minneapolis; he is an intervention therapist working with children, families, and their teachers. He has also been a classroom teacher. Mr. McGee's presentations focused on the importance of the development of self-esteem in children, and how self-perception can be changed within adults who are working with children, or who are parents, themselves. He did one full day session on developing the full potential of children and their families.

Ms. Olson says of the conference: "Mr. McGee shared his own life experience to reinforce the importance of positive life experiences in the development of a child's self-esteem. He advised us to build on the strengths of children, since it is 'virtually impossible to build on one's weaknesses'. Mr. McGee asked the audience, 'Who do we tell them they (our children) are?' He recommended that we 'catch them being good.... and convince them that they are....BRIGHT, LOVEABLE, STRONG, BEAUTIFUL, RESPONSIBLE, COURAGEOUS, SPECIAL, etc. Also, we must find ways to pass emotional messages to our children on a daily basis. Positive means to accomplish this by giving hugs, smiles, winks, handshakes, high-fives, and shoulder taps, accompanied with lots of love.'

Mr. McGee went on to say, 'Every time we enhance our children's self-esteem, we give them integrity. When we reinforce negative behaviors, we build on our children's weaknesses; therefore, try building on POSITIVE BEHAVIORS AND STRENGTHS. CATCH THEM BEING GOOD AND FLAUNT IT TO THEM UNTIL THEY BELIEVE IT!'"

Small toys and small children

can be lethal mix

Dangerous toys:

Leahy's list of dangerous toy's includes: pull-string Swimming Hippo and pullstring Swimming Frog, made by Masudaya; Busy Bumpkins Stroller, by Uneeda Doll Co.; Jeep Jr. 4X4, by Power Wheels-Kransco Group; Sesame Street Sewing Box, by Sandberg; Sesame Street Nursery Set, by Tara Toy Corp.; Play Cars, by Andresito; Vanilla Kitty Scented Ice Cream Pets, by Leader Toy Corp.; Sembl-eez Take Apart Put-Together Toy Car, by Irwin Toy Limited; and Battery Operated Symphony Loco, by Blue Box. "We do this because the (federal) Consumer Product Safety Commission and the state consumer protection department doesn't have the manpower to catch everything," Leahy said. "We're trying to make more parents aware of the dangers." Leahy showed a Fisher-Price Little People toy responsible for the choking deaths of three children in 1990. The small figures have a ballshaped head and cylindrical body. "This has been pulled off the

Hartford Courant market, but we were able to buy this toy yesterday," Leahy says. "Not all the inventory is gone."

He released a list of dangerous toys from studies done in September and October by public interest research groups visiting stores in 26 states. Most of them posed choking hazards to young children.

Nationwide in 1987, there were 131,000 emergency-room-treated injuries caused by toys. That figure increased to 164,500 in 1990, according to the Consumer Product Safety Commission, the federal agency responsible for monitoring toys in the marketplace. In 1989 there were 13 choking deaths; in 1990 there were 14 such deaths; and through September of this year, there have been five deaths.

Since 1979, the safety commission has used a choke tube, a testing device that checks if a small toy is a potential choking hazard. The device is a hollow cylinder with an interior diameter of 1½ inches and a slanted bottom with a depth of 1 to 2¼ inches. If the entire product or any part of the product that separates during play fits entirely within the cylinder, the product is banned.

"Parents can buy one of these testing devices from us for \$1," Leahy says. "We recommend they take it with them when toy shopping and actually test the parts."

The device can be purchased by calling (800) 542-8338. The kit includes the pamphlet "Tips for Toy Safety."

The Consumer Product Safety Commission doesn't compile a specific list of dangerous toys, but it recalled 165 toys this year, including certain teddy bears, dolls, trucks, trains, tools and cocking utensils. Last year, 252 toys were recalled.

JUST HOLD MY HAND AND WALK ME BACK TO THE WORLD I ONCE KNEW.





MR.THOMAS CONDON, DIRECTOR OF PROJECT BASIC, from the Standing Rock Community College, Ft. Yates, North Dakota, was the GUEST SPEAKER.

Mr. Condon was one of the sub ects of an article that appeared in <u>THE</u> BISMARCK TRIBUNE, September 18, 1991. The article is below.



FORT YATES — Nearly half the native population on Standing Rock Indian Reservation lacks a high school diploma, estimates a college administrator there.

To change that, Standing Rock College has equipped a huge recreational vehicle with a teacher, books, laptop computers, TV and instructional videotapes.

"If they can't come to the classroom, we'll come to them," said Tom Condon, director of adult basic education and the RV project at the college.

Condon says three reservation towns — Fort Yates, Little Eagle and McLaughlin — have college centers where people can study for their high school equivalency exams.

But many reservation residents live in remote, isolated areas and don't have reliable cars. And many can't afford baby sitters while they're away at a full day of school.

Basic skills instructor Cheryl Red Eagle will use the RV to offer tutoring in Porcupine, Wakpala, Bullhead, Kenel and Cannon Ball.

Already 120 people between the ages of 18 and 60 have enrolled in the RV tutoring program. Students will be tested to determine what areas they need to concentrate on before taking the high school equivalency exam.

Once that's determined, Red Eagle will work individually with students to prepare them for the exam. She has a communications degree from the University of Mary.

Condon and Red Eagle also will offer career counseling in the RV.

"Our ultimate goal is not just to get the GED but to do something with it by gaining employment," Condon said.

The RV should be ready to roll Oct 1. Instruction will be offered year-round at no charge to students. The program is paid for by a \$130,000 grant to the college. Students can take as much time as they need to prepare for the test.

Condon said the program will even pay a student's mileage to and from the high school equivalency test site. Condon said the roving educational concept is novel and he knows of no other reservation that is taking learning on the road in the same fashion.



The Grand Opening of the NEW STUDENT BANK on the campus of the United Tribes Technical College was held on February 21, 1992.




