Champions crowned at United Tribes

BISMARCK (UTN) - Champion dancers and singers earned top honors in two-dozen performance categories here at the 36th Annual United Tribes International Powwow. Four days of contest events ended Sunday, September 11; winners took home over \$70,000 in prize money.

The drum group Battle River, Red Lake, MN, won the singing contest, followed in order by Fort Peck nux, Iron Boy, Rocky Boy, Evabay. d Crooked Lake Agency.

Twenty-five drum groups rendered their best songs for 521 reg-

istered contestants, and many other dancers, who displayed their talent during seven grand entries, specials and contests. Steve Charging Eagle, Cheyenne River, provided a ground blessing at Lone Star Arena and prayers during several of the grand entries

Summer-like weather prevailed with daytime temps mostly in the 80s, except Saturday afternoon when the thermometer hit 94 degrees.

The United Tribes Technical College cafeteria staff and 22 volunteers served a free meal Sunday for 2,500 people with buffalo provided by the

Sisseton-Wahpeton Oyate.

All first place dance category and singing contest winners received a jacket with the colorful 36th anniversary powwow logo, a bronze horse trophy, and cash. Second through fifth place winners received cash awards.

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

UTTC Hosts 2005 Advanced Nutrition Institute



The UTTC Land Grant Extension Program hosted the 2005 Advanced Nutrition Institute on campus June 21-23. The Institute was planned through a partnership with the Mountain Plains Regional WIC Office. Participants were mostly Tribal WIC staff from the mountain plains region, but also included Indian Health Service and Tribal Diabetes Program Nine different Tribes were represented by the participants. The Institute included updates on WIC Program information, childhood obesity, historical trauma, breastfeeding in the workplace, maternal nutrition, traditional plants, and awareness for prevention of illegal drug usage including methamphetamines. and entertainment was also provided through one night of Frisbee golf. pitchfork fondue, and a presentation on cultural plants by Dakota Goodhouse.


This was the second training we provided through our partnership with the Mountain Plains Regional WIC Office. Last summer UTTC Extension hosted the basic WIC 101 training which included an introduction to WIC and basic nutrition information in the areas of maternal, infant, and children. Recently UTTC was awarded another USDA grant to support a formal nutrition training institute for Tribal communities in the Great Plains. This grant begins in September and goes through August 2007.






'Culture Shock' was musical mix

American University offers internships for lative Students

American Indian and Alaskan Native Students have an opportunity to work and study in Washington, DC for the semester or the summer. The Washington Internships for Native Students (WINS) program arranges for students to work 35- 40 hours a week in a federal agency. Students also take courses and earn credit hours.

The program provides: Transportation to and from DC, subway passes, tuition and books, stipend for incidentals, housing at American University's Tenley Campus dormitories, meal plan, and social and cultural activities and field trips.

You are eligible if you are currently enrolled in an academic program, will have 60 credits earned by program start date and maintain at least a 2.5 cumulative GPA. 
Please know that if you ignore the reserved sign and park in these spaces, you may hinder a quick response for someone in need of care.


Baird receives high honor

"By that you epitomize what good leadership is about." The program recognized Baird's honorary Doctorate from Sinte Gleska University. Humbled by the honor and recognition, Baird said he grew up around horses and recalled that once he cut school to go riding. "When I told an elder horseman what I'd done, he said, 'school is always in session.' I came to understand that education is a lifelong learning process."



ND Tribes pass resolution against UND nickname

BISMARCK (UTN) - Representatives of all of North Dakota's tribal nations have approved a resolution supporting the NCAA action against the University of North Dakota and asking that the "Fighting Sioux" nickname be changed. The United Tribes of North Dakota Board of Directors took the action September 8 here at the close of a three-day intertribal council summit meeting.

The resolution supports a recent action by the NCAA banning UND and other colleges from using "hostile and abusive" nicknames, logos and mascots in NCAA tournaments. It calls on the NCAA to deny an appeal by UND seeking an exemption from the new policy.

United Tribes of North Dakota is made up of the five tribes located wholly, or in part, in North Dakota: Mandan/Hidatsa/Arikara Nation, Spirit Lake Nation, Sisseton-Wahpeton Oyate, Standing Rock Sioux Tribe, and Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa.

The resolution called on the North Dakota Board of Higher Education and the president of UND to hold formal consultations and negotiations with North Dakota tribes about use of the logo and nickname and consider how to change them to ones not offensive to any ethnic group.

"A poll by one of the major daily


newspapers showed most Indian people think UND should change the name if tribes request it," said David M. Gipp, United Tribes Technical College president. "That's what tribes have been doing for a long time. UND and the Board of Higher Education haven't been listening."

A talk during the summit by UND President Charles Kupchella failed to convince tribal leaders that the university has ensured respectful use of the name and logo.

Summit participants saw copies of hate letters directed toward Indian students, images of the UND logo and nickname that promote drinking, and T-shirts used at sporting events that carried degrading images and slogans of Indians.

The board's resolution said the continued use of the "Sioux" nickname promotes an atmosphere of hostility on the campus that has resulted in numerous ugly incidents, including beatings, vandalism, death threats and other incidents directed toward American Indian students and others who advocate for changing the name.


The resolution urged that steps be taken to reduce racial tensions on the UND campus and make people accountable for actions against Native American students.

Twenty busses and countless mini-vans brought over 2,500 youngsters from Bismarck-Mandan and surrounding areas for a free visit to the United Tribes International Powwow on Friday, September 9. Prior to Grand Entry, young people lining the dance arbor were coaxed by Master of Ceremonies Lawrence Baker to do the audience wave. Events of the day were geared toward visiting young people, who later participated in intertribal dances. Youth Day was made possible with support from Bismarck Public Schools.
