

Vossler believes that the key to being a successful leader is having a positive attitude. For example, he pointed out that the popular teachers in a school are usually those who have a positive attitude and not the "easy classes."

Prior to joining Rainmaker, Vossler directed the Harold Schafer Leadership Center at the University of Mary, Bismarck. He also served as education director at Mercy Hospital Center, Williston, where he developed and delivered training programs for hospital staff. He has undergraduate degrees in Physical Education and Mathematics, and a Masters Degree in Mathematics and Management.

Students land summer internships

Six students from United Tribes Technical College have been accepted for summer research internships at Agricultural Research Centers of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Three of the students are in United Tribe's Nutrition and Foodservice Program: Betsy Small Jumper (Lower Brule), Margaret Vivier and Ivy Thunderhawk (both Standing Rock). And three are from the college's Tribal Environmental Science Program: Alexa Azure (Standing Rock), and Ron Campbell and Richard White (both Oglala).

The students were selected for the internships on a competitive application basis.

An agreement between the ARS and UTTC calls for mentored research experiences for American Indian students at UTTC who are interested in environmental science, food and nutrition, agriculture and biology. One of the goals is to heighten interest in careers in scientific research.

Four ARS centers and laboratories in the two Dakotas will host the students for the summer-long experience. The students were matched with their areas of research interest. Each will receive a salary as a federal employee, housing, and travel assistance.

UTTC seat belt usage down

Results of the annual Spring Seat Belt Survey show that seat belt usage among drivers on the UTTC campus has declined since last year.

The survey was conducted April 11 by freshman Injury Prevention students at the main college entrance near University Drive.

The survey showed that 66 percent of men drivers were buckled up and 61 percent of women. That compares with belt usage rates of 73 percent and 70 percent respectively for men and women drivers last year.

The decline in usage can be attributed to a number of factors: larger campus population; greater number of younger students in the student body; and unawareness about the law.


In North Dakota, drivers may be stopped for a seatbelt violation and cited when people under age 18 are not belted or secured in child passenger seats. At age 18 and over, people who do not wear seatbelts may be cited as a secondary violation nen a vehicle is stopped for another reason.

Injury Prevention students and staff believe that more effort needs to be made to enforce the North Dakota state seat belt law. In addition to gathering seat belt data, Injury Prevention students also observed the following:

- Drivers smoking
- Children improperly buckled
- Drivers and passengers buckling up when seeing the checkpoint
- Motorcyclists with no helmets
- Children riding bicycles with no safety gear
- Children under the age of 13 riding in the front passenger seat
- Drivers reading while driving
- Numerous staff/faculty members not buckled up
- Rear facing infant seat with handle up

These observations lead to the conclusion that other safety issues need to be addressed, in particular child passenger safety seat awareness. Numerous children were not properly restrained for their age, weight, and height. Parents did not realize the danger for children in allowing them to ride in the front passenger seat.

Even though current seat belt usage is down, it's not the lowest seat belt compliance observed during this study, which has been underway since 1997. The lowest usage recorded for men was 45 percent in 2003 and 43 percent for women drivers in 1997.

Mumps outbreak centered in lowa

Editor's Note: The following information was submitted by the UTTC Student Health Center to alert students and staff members to review their shot records concerning MMR (Measles, Mumps & Rubella) vaccine.

According to a Joint Statement from the American College Health Association and the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, the state of Iowa has been experiencing a large outbreak of mumps. Cases of mumps are under investigation in eight neighboring states: Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, and Wisconsin.

The majority of cases are occurring among persons age 18-25; many who are vaccinated are on college campuses.

College lifestyles make students and staff more vulnerable to infectious diseases; they live, study, eat, and exercise in close quarters making transmission easier. It is recommended [by North Dakota health officials] that all students, staff, and health care workers have two doses of MMR.

If an outbreak should occur in North Dakota, for example, if a case would be identified at UTTC, even susceptible persons before 1957 should receive one dose. [No outbreaks have been reported in the state, although there have been isolated cases, and no cases of mumps have been seen at the UTTC Student Health Center as of 4-24-06].

It is entirely up to the individual to locate their immunization record.

Mumps is most commonly spread by people coughing and sneezing. Infection with the mumps virus results in tenderness and swelling of the salivary glands in the cheeks and neck.

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


Flutist Andrew Vasquez was also nominated in the category Flutist of the Year for his CD Togo.
