Every dancer or singer who participated did not have to pay, Indian or Non-Indian. At the pay-gate, every person had to pay regardless of race. It cost \$1.00 per person and 50¢ for the younger people and children under 12 were admitted free.

On the morning of the 6th, the piercing took place which lasted till noon. This is real sacred to the Indian. It was very interesting; you would have to see it to believe and understand.

Also on these days of the 5th and 6th, South Dakota Rodeo Association held their rodeo which took place also during the pow-wow.

On the morning of the 5th at 11:00 A.M., there was a parade. It was one of the biggest and best parades Pine Ridge pow-wow has ever had. Floats represented visitors from the surrounding states. As a student from United Tribes, I was wishing we had a float to represent the United Tribes Employment Training Center.

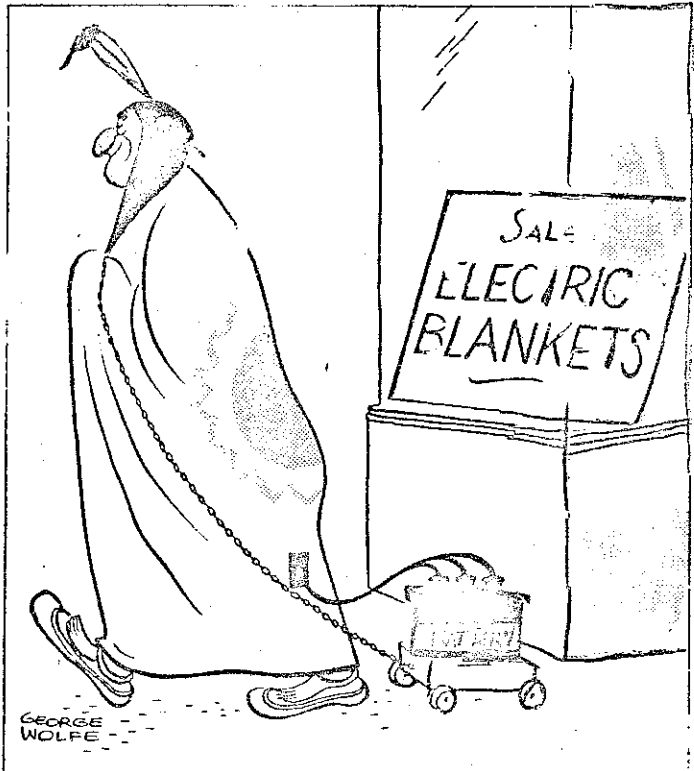

Let's give her our utmost support as this program may not get you to Heaven--but it'll surely take us out of the hell we alcoholics are living in.

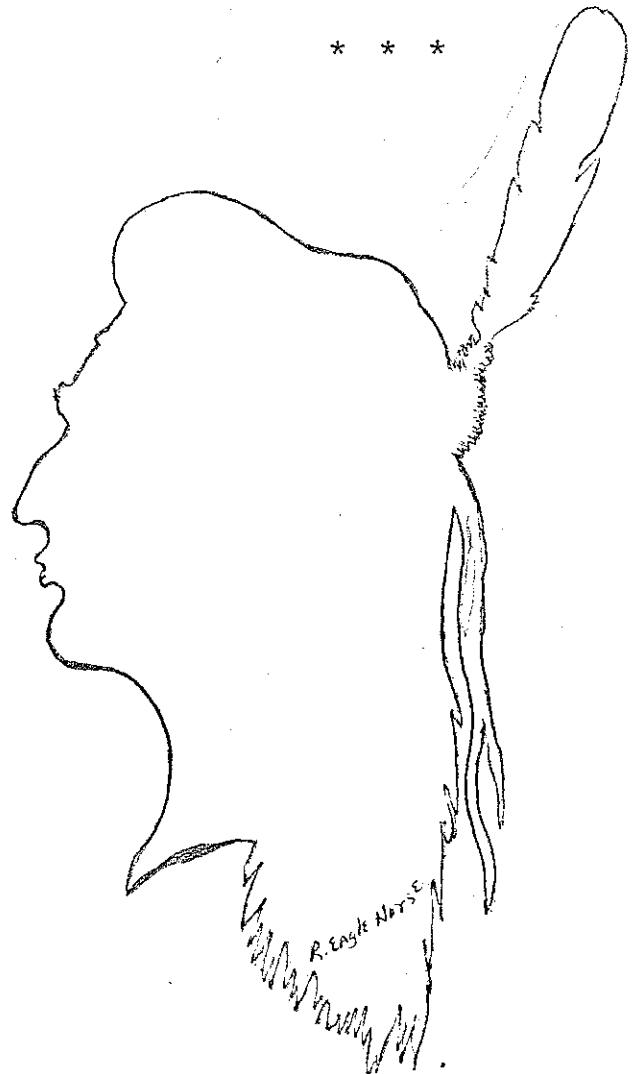

The only person to win a prize in the dancing contest from the center was Evans Elk, a student from Cannon Ball, North Dakota. He won third place in the fancy dance contest. Overall there was about three hundred registered dancers and about one hundred non-registered dancers. There were about 13 different singing groups from various tribes. The rodeo also had entries from various states. Some of our students and staff members entered, but the only one that placed was Gainus Little Soldier, a staff member. He won first place in calf roping. Everybody really enjoyed themselves at the Pow-Wow and rodeo and we hope to have a wonderful time like this again next year.

We also have a new recreation Director, his name is Jess Coffey. He is a Comanche-Delaware from Lawton, Oklahoma. The rest of the month was spent with the usual evenings and the movie "Cimaron" shown on the week-end with football practice in the evenings in preparation for the annual "Toilet Bowl" game between the students and staff. There are also basketball games in the evenings at the gym between the students here and students from Mary College. We hope next month to be more active in all of our recreational facilities, now that our schedule has returned to normal.
