Dear Editor:

UCLA has initiated a new recruiting program for Fall 1973 in order to increase our contacts with native Americans. The American Indian Studies Center, workin close cooperation with the Department of Recruitment and Institutioanal Relations, is anxious to expand UCLA's enrollments of qualified native American students. However, since many students live outside the greater Los Angeles area, we are unable to contact them directly. It is this effort that we are asking you to support.

UCLA is rated among one of the top ranking universities in the United States. It has achieved scholastic excellence without losing sight of ethnic contributions, as demonstrated by the American Indian, Asian American, Latin American, Chicano, Near Eastern and African Studies Centers.

In order to help financially needy students, UCLA has an extensive Undergraduate Recruitment and Development Program. URD offers financial, academic and counseling assistance for students who meet regular admission requirements or who have demonstrated the potential to succeed in the University. It also pays the out-of-state tuition, amounting to \$1,500 a year, for native American students who qualify for the program.

To get a first-hand glimpse of UCLA, the Alumni Association is sponsoring a High School Day on October 23, 1972. Since it is a regular school day for the University, high school students will be able to attend classes, tour the campus, and see films. This is just one of the many activities that takes place at UCLA, and we encourage as many students as possible to participate. The American Indian Studies Center, located in Campbell Hall, Room 3221, will also be open for anyone who wants to meet our staff.

We ask that your newspaper or newsletter print an article about UCLA's native American recruitment and the October 23, High School Day. Both programs hope to reach out and draw more American Indian students to UCLA.

KEYAPI KOOKIN'

Fresh Corn Puffs

(Makes about 4 dozen)

4 ears fresh corn or 2 (10 oz.) packages

frozen corn on the cob

3 cups shortening or oil for deep fat frying

½ cup flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

½ teaspoon salt

¼ teaspoon paprika

1/8 teaspoon fresh ground pepper

3 eggs, beaten until light

Husk the corn, remove silks, and scrape kernels and pulp from the cob, if you use frozen corn, thaw well before scraping. There should be about 1/4 cups corn and pulp. Place shortening or oil in a large kettle, and begin to heat slowly. For deep-fat frying the te erature be 350 F. Use a deep-fot thermometer to determine exact temperature. It will take 10 - 15 minutes for the fat to become hot enough for frying. Sift together the dry ingredients. Mix in the eggs and corn. Drop batter from a teaspoon into the hot oil. Fry the puffs until they are light and golden brown on all sides. Drain on paper toweling and serve.

Venison Mincemet

(Makes 2 quarts)

1 quart apple cider

2 cups seedless raisins

1 cup dried cooked currants

3 greening apples, peeled, cored, and chopped

1 cup chopped suet

2 pounds ground venison

2 teaspoons salt

2 teaspoons cinnamon

2 teaspoons ginger

1 teaspoon cloves

1 teaspoon nutmeg

½ teaspoon allspice

Place the cider, raisins, currants, apples, and suet in a large, heavy kettle, cover, and simmer for 2 hours. Stir in remaining ingredients, and simmer, uncovered, for 2 hours, stirring occasionally. Use as pie filling.
