DEDICATION OF JAMERSON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

The dedication for the Elementary School was held on Friday, February 23, at 3:00 p.m. in the Jamerson Elementary School. The students and staff were excused for the day, so that they could attend.

Warren Means was there, along with other guest speakers, representing different tribes.

The first speaker introduced was Claude Red Tail Longie from Fort Totten. He opened the dedication with an Indian prayer in his own Sioux language. Then an Indian version of the national anthem was sung by the Fort Berthold Tribal Council Members.

Mr. Wyman Babby, Area Director of BIA, was the guest speaker. He revealed ideas concerning the Indian people to invest their future into the elementary students of today. He encouraged all Indian people to become active and participate in activities and be more aware of our Indian future heritage to be more incentive.

Then Aljoe Agard, Tribal Judge for Fort Yates, spoke about Mr. Jamerson as being a cog in the wheel in implementing and developing United Tribes as an experimental program with the help of the other tribes.

This was followed by a speech given by Mr. Art Link, Governor of N.D. He said, "his office doors were open to all those who wanted to better themselves."

Then Warren Means presented the Governor with a beaded neck-tie, as a tie between United Tribes and the Governor's office.

He also awarded Theodore Jamerson (Tiny Bud) a peace pipe. A plaque dedicating the new school in Mr. Jamerson's honor will hang in the school. The Student Body also gave Governor Link a beaded neck-tie. They gave Mr. Jamerson (Tiny Bud) a statue of "The End of the Trail." After the presentation, Theodore Jamerson gave his speech and said, "his dream has finally come true." "A dream that will make a future heritage proud." He concluded his speech by saying, "I thank everyone who has made this day possible. I feel like one of the prisoners coming home from war, God Bless America!"

After the dedication, refreshments were served and everyone visited and toured the school and had a good time.

Girls are also given the responsibility of a detail. These consist of taking care of lounges, mopping floors, washing sinks.


mopping the shower room, and cleaning the stairways. By doing these details, the girls make the dorm a better place to live.

The dorm also holds a dorm government meeting every Wednesday night at six. At these meetings, the girls talk about what rules are made for certain things. Fines are collected from girls for missing a detail. They are asked what they would like to get with the money that is collected from the fines.

With all the girls working together, they make the dorm a very good place to live.
