I pledge myself, as a responsible human to assume my share of man's stewardship of our natural resources.

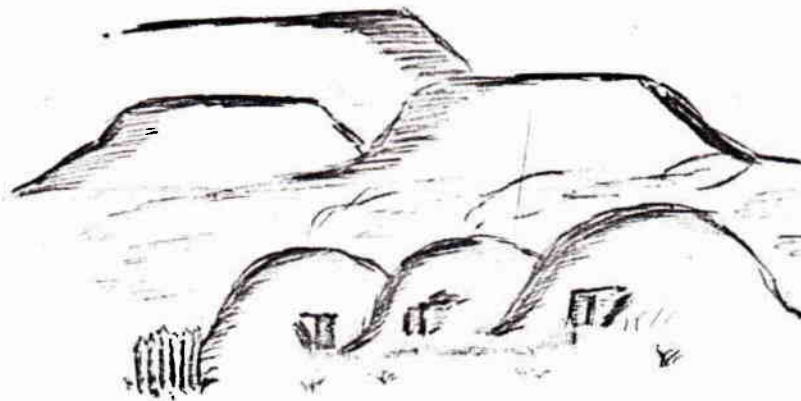
I will use my share with gratitude, without greed or waste.

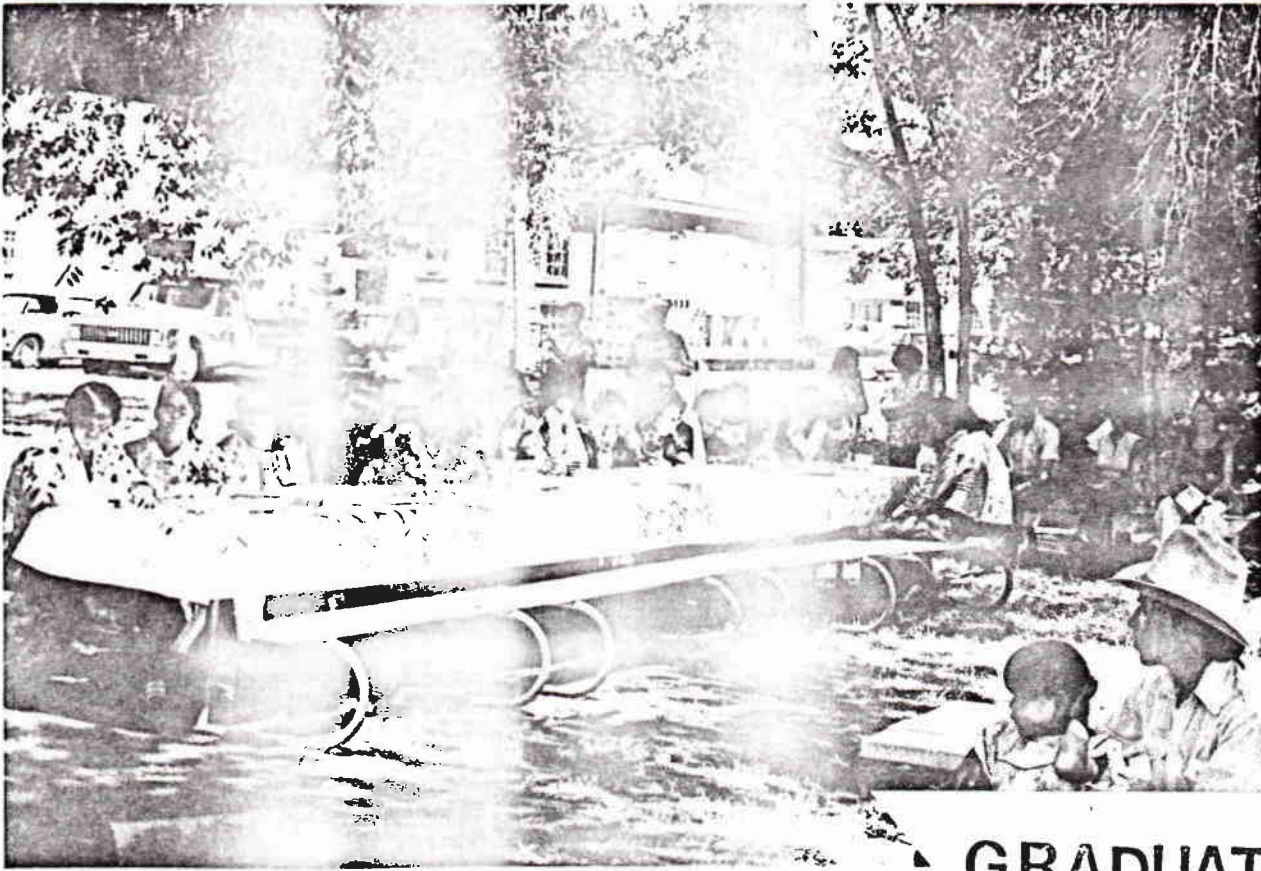

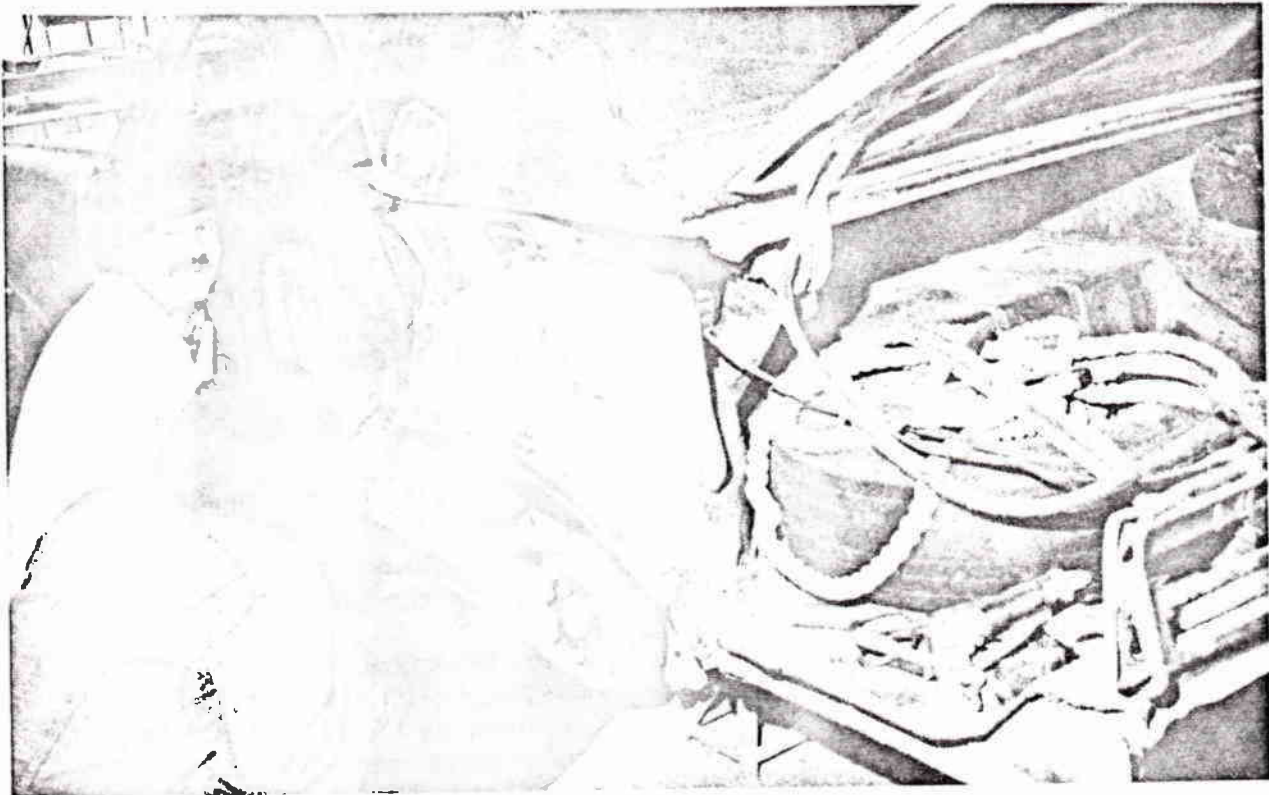

On August 8, 9, 10 and 11th, we will be hosting the 1st Annual Renewal of the Lakota Nation Trade Fair. This fair has not been held since the establishment of the reservations.

There are two purposes for renewal of the fair. First is the establishment of a market for Indian made arts and crafts. Secondly, to provide an opportunity to share the experience of one of American's many heritages. The fair will also provide an opportunity for non-Indians and Indians to exchange ideas and philosophies thereby greatly reducing stereotypes that people may have of each other.

This great county of ours is composed of a pluralistic society and the recognition of each groups values is important.

This Trade Fair will also be having contests in many different areas. They are: canoeing, bow and arrow, dancing, singing, foot races, etc.

We have been extremely fortunate in having businessmen close to our reservations so they could furnish us with goods and supplies. Once again we must ask our neighborly businessmen for aid. Through different activities we have been raising money for the establishment of the fair, but at this late date we are still considerably short of our goal of \$4,500.00.

We would appreciate any amount of money you may wish to donate to the fair. Please make checks payable to: Lower Brule Sioux Tribe and send to Allen "Chuck" Ross, Lower Brule Agency, Lower Brule, South Dakota.

There are approximately 5,000 people expected to visit the fair. During the performance of the fair, we will hand out a list of all persons and businesses who have donated money for the fair.

Our plan is to make the fair self-supporting through general admission and rental space for food and arts and crafts concessions.
