DAY CARE CENTER

In Building 30, there are three areas where children stay during the day--Small Nursery Area: ages 8 weeks to 1 year, Large Nursery Area--ages 1 and 2; Toddler Area: ages 2 and 3.

In Building 32, are the Pre-School children--Pre-School I: ages 3 and 4 and Pre-School II: ages 5 and 6.

Upon arrival, the children have quite direct activities, such as breakfast with a learning situation and language, names of foods, table manners. They develop small muscles by using utensils, cleaning up and putting things away. Large muscles are developed with outdoor and indoor activities including swimming, physical education, swings, bicycles, tricycles. Older learning skills and concepts depend on the age of the child. These children also go on field trips.

In the Pre-School area, the children learn colors, shapes, songs, finger plays and recognize their own name in print. They also go on field trips.

The Pre-School II children learn language--beginning sounds, rhyme words, number recognition and writing their names. They have free choice of activities, take walks and go on field trips.

Each child is evaluated monthly according to age level. These evaluations are used as guides in teaching specific skills and for parent conferences. The parents may see their child's evaluation anytime at the Center office.

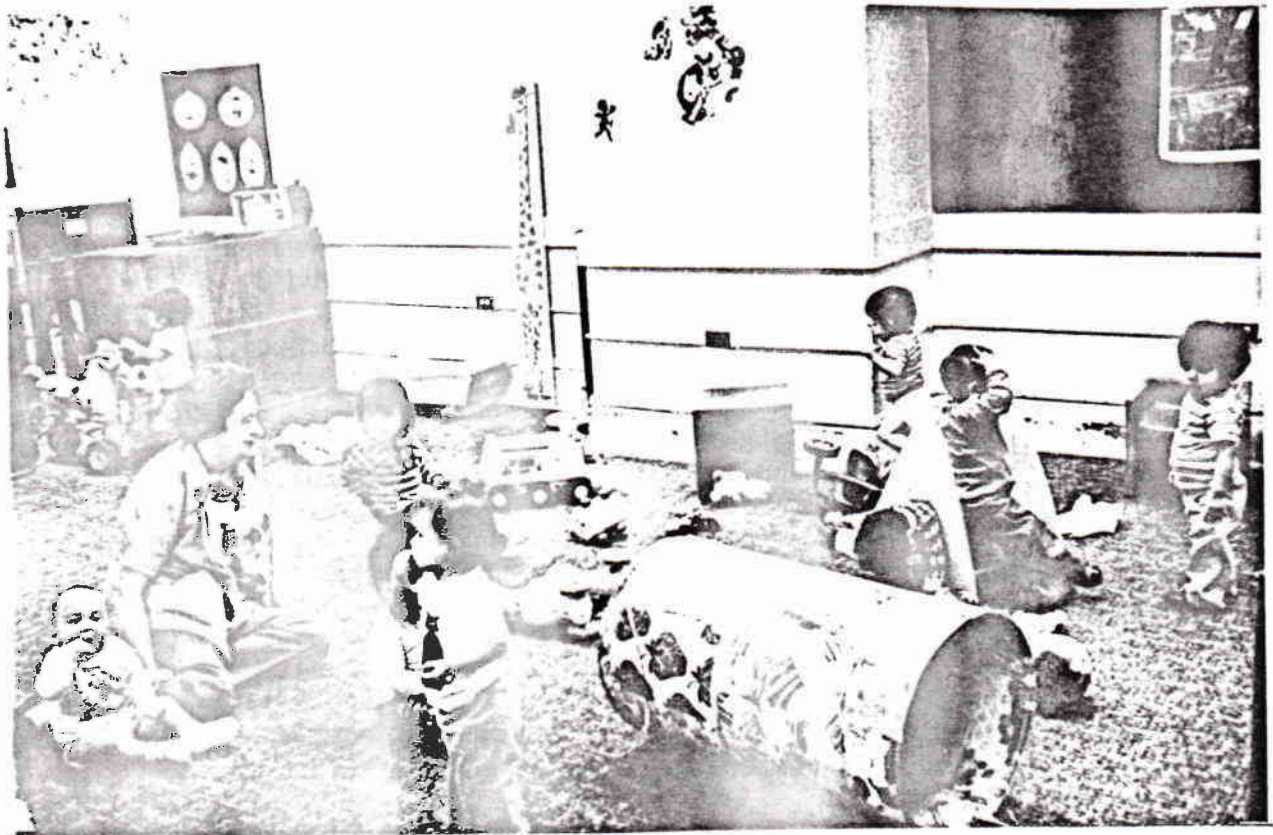

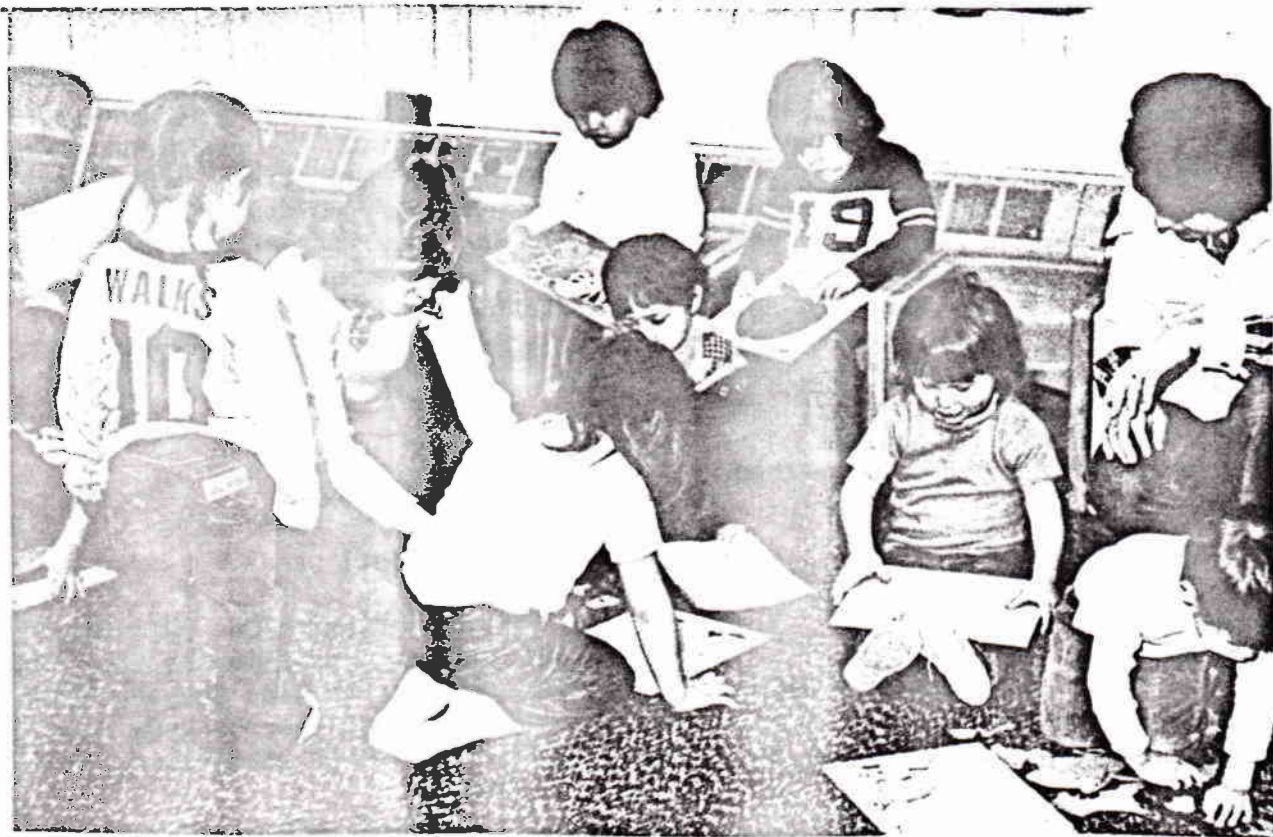
In appreciation to Patricia Stuen for all the work and time she put into planting flowers behind the education building. We want you to know that you've made it the most attractive place here at "Tribes".

The flowers are all so colorful and beautiful, and have really added to the building. I know I speak for a lot of students. "Thank You".

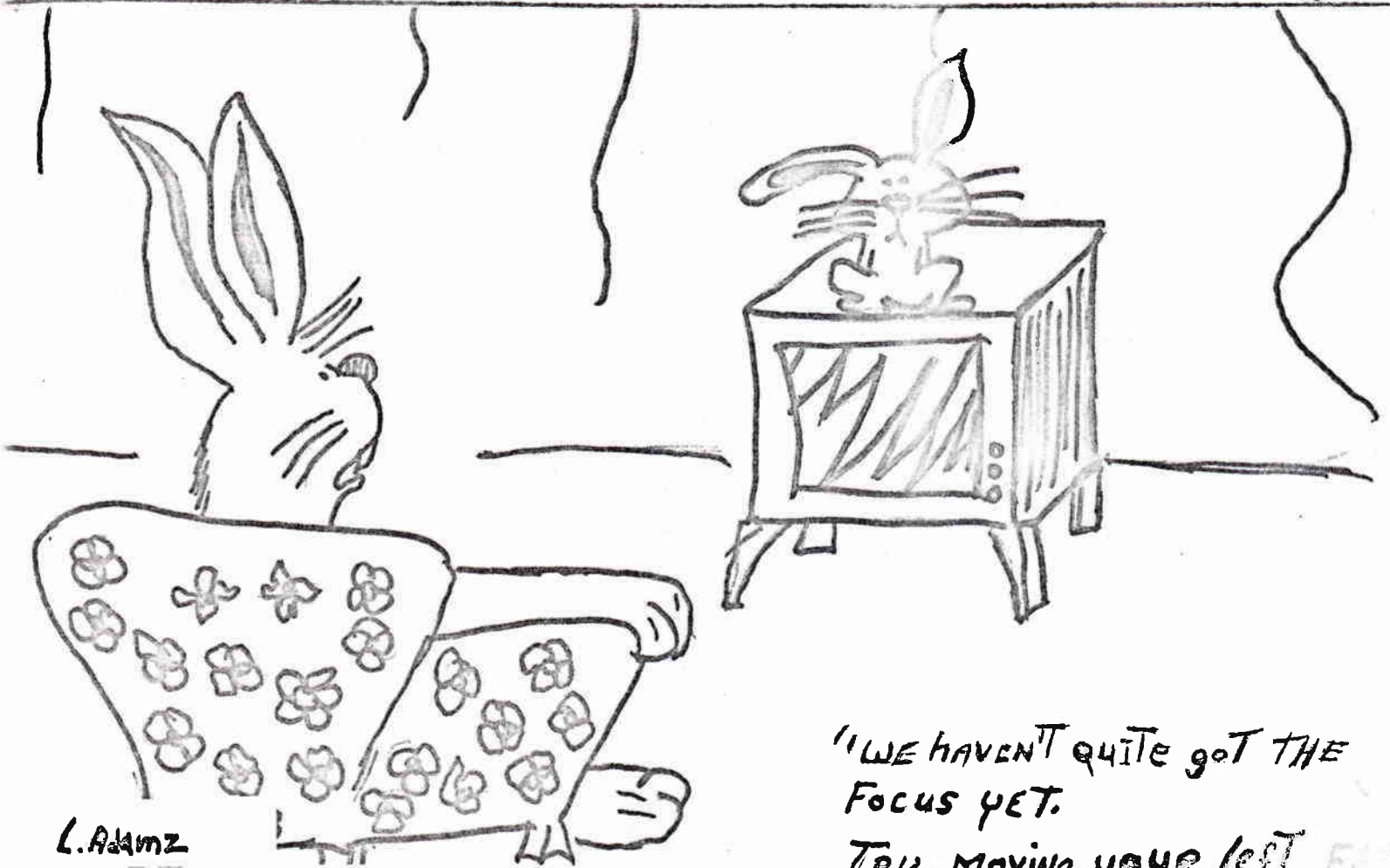

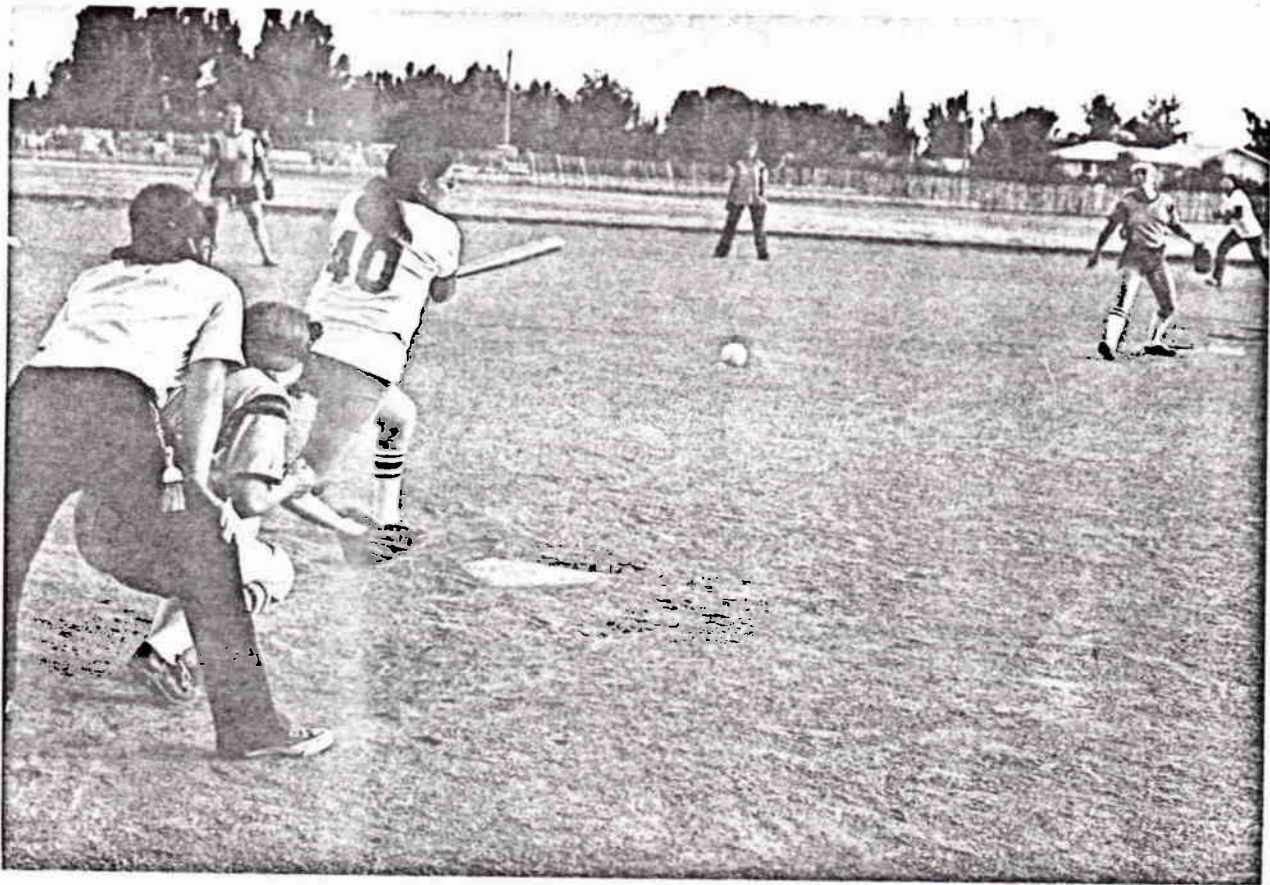

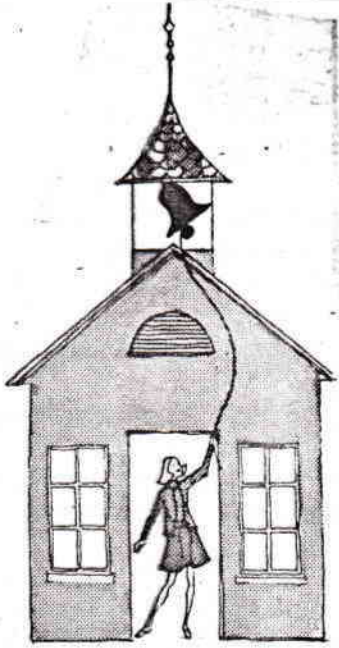
