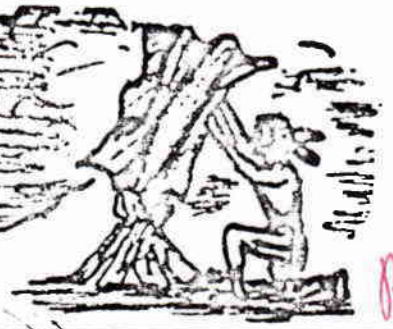

As a child I understood how to give; I have forgotten this grace since I became civilized. I lived the natural life, whereas I now live the artificial. Any pebble was valuable to me then; every growing tree an object of reverence. Now I worship with the white man before a painted landscape whose value is estimated in dollars! Thus the Indian is reconstructed as the natural rocks are ground to power and made into artificial blocks which maybe built into the walls of modern society.

The first American mingled with his pride a singular humility. Spiritual arrogance was foreign to his nature and teaching. He never claimed that the power of articulate speech was proof of superiority over the dumb creation on the other hand, it is to him a perilous gift. He believes profoundly in silence-the sign of a perfect equilibrium. Silence is the absolute poise or balance of body, mind and spirit. The man who preserves his self-hood is ever calm and unshaken by the storms of existence-not a leaf, as it were astir on a tree; not a ripple upon the surface of the shining pool--his, in the mind of the unlettered sage, is the ideal attitude and conduct of life.

If you ask him, "What is silence?" He will answer; "It is the Great Mystery! The holy silence is His voice! "If you ask; "What are the fruits of silence?" he will say: "They are self-control, true courage, endurance, patience, dignity and reverence. Silence is the cornerstone of character.

"Guard your tongue in youth,"said the old chief, Wabashaw, "and in age you may mature a thought that will be of service to your people."

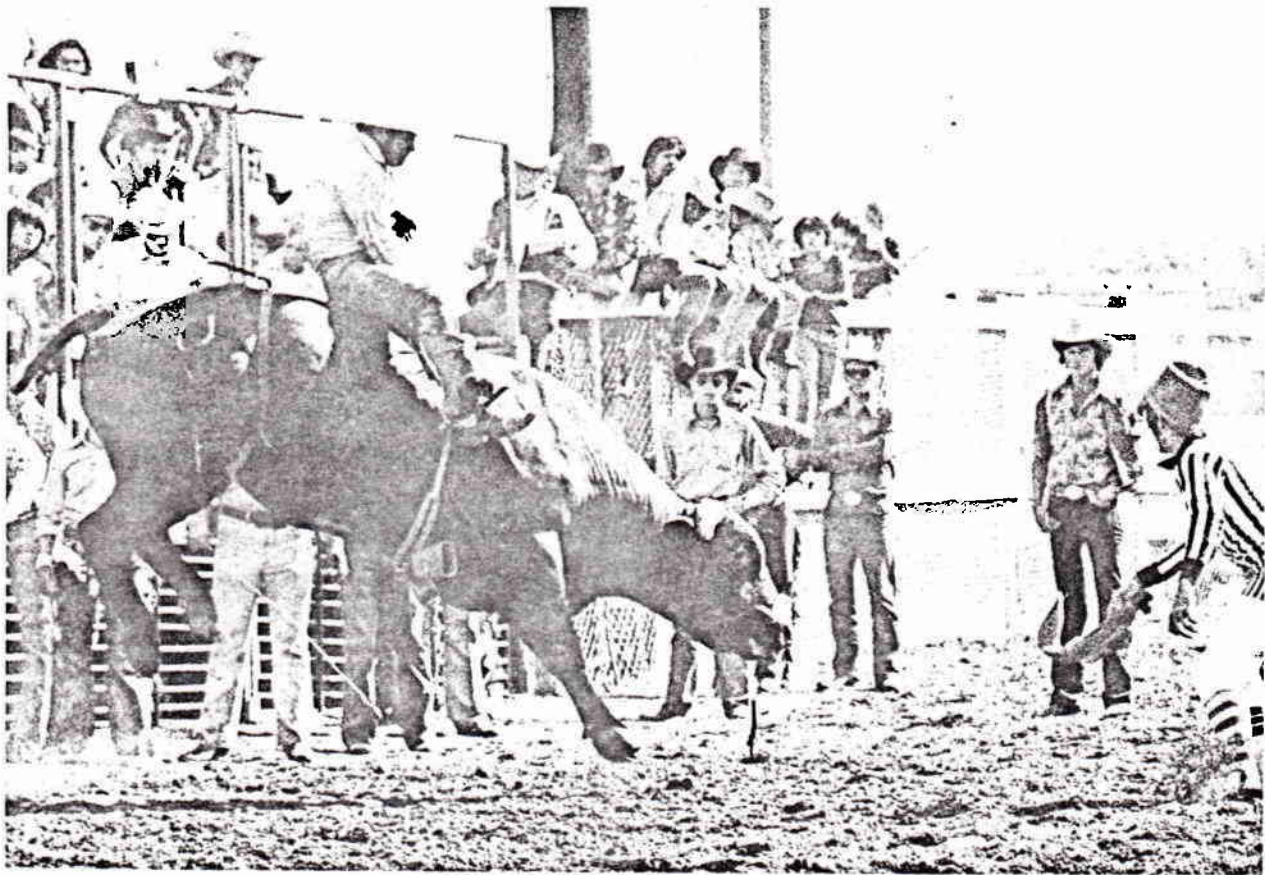

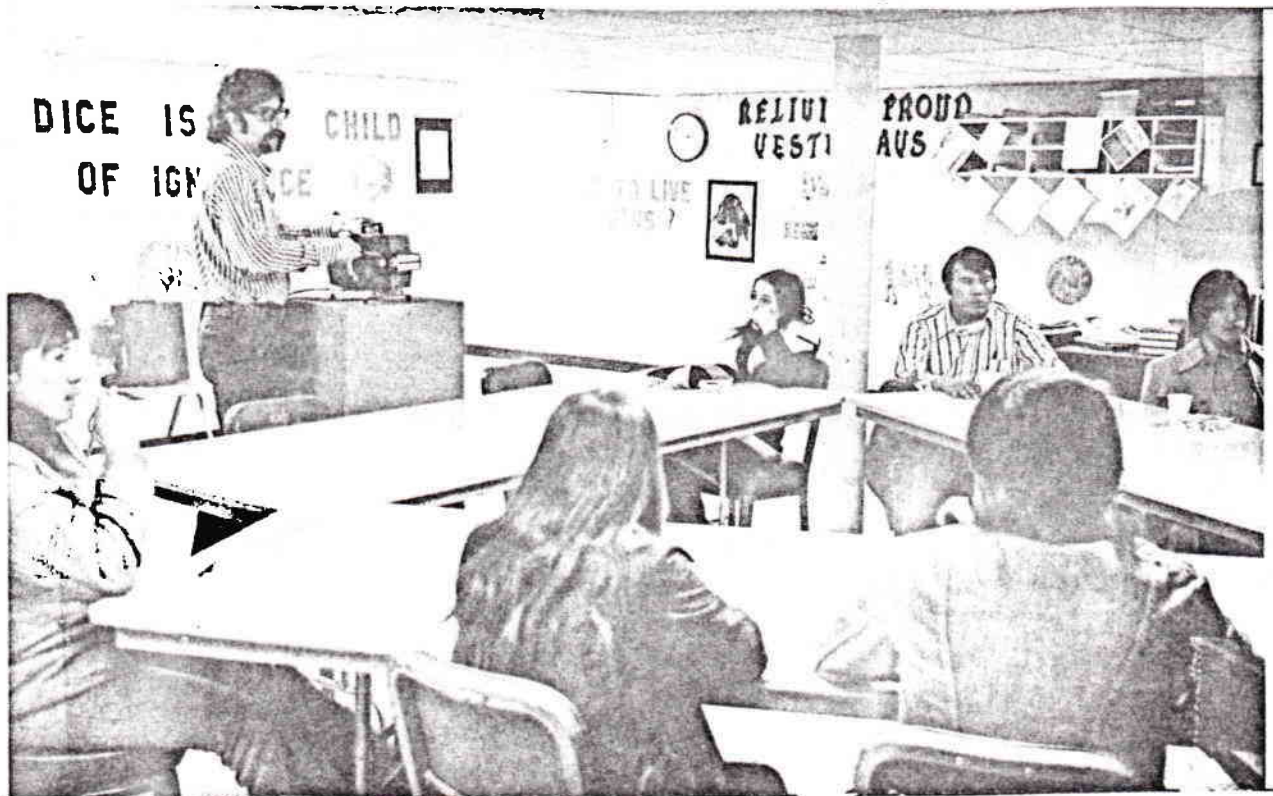

All the students and staff who wish to donate blood to the Blood Services at Bismarck are asked to come to the dispensary on center, September 26, 1974. The blood will be used for people in need of transfusion therapy at Bismarck and in area hospitals.

Any man or woman 17 years and older and weighs at least 110 lbs. can qualify to donate. They ask that you not give blood if you have in the past eight weeks.

There are some restrictions on a blood donor. You will be asked specific questions during a pre-screening process, prior to giving blood. This is for your protection and that of the recipient.

I think this is a good thing. It may hurt a little but you will be saving a life somewhere.

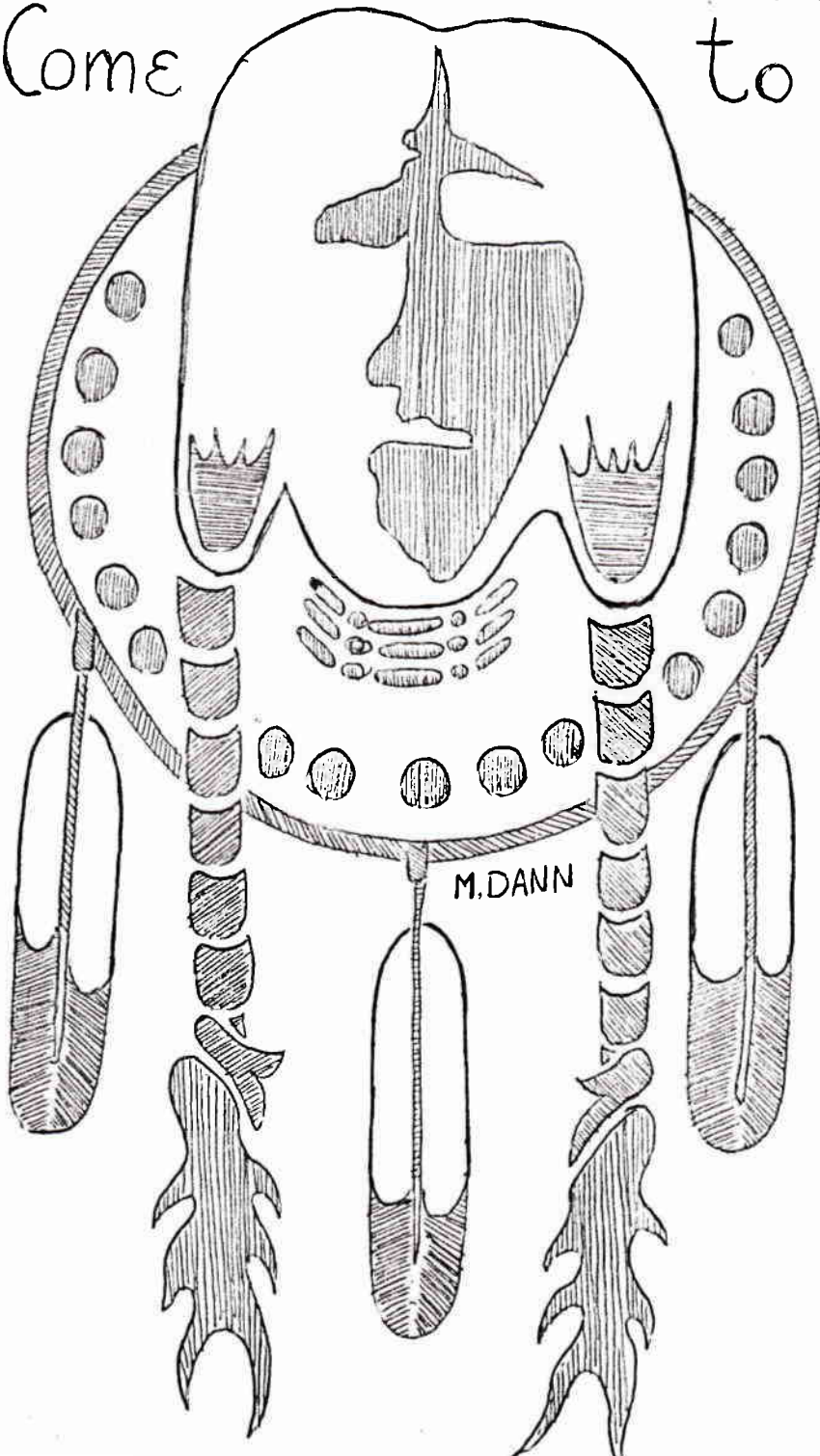

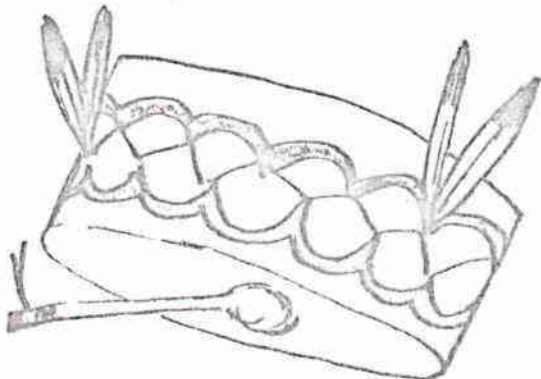

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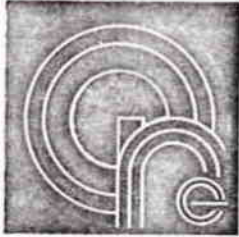
