
The Basketball team consists of both women and girls from the dorm and housing areas and one action student. The girls who are on the team are as follows:



If you hoot with the owls at night you can't soar with the eagles in the morning.

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


For the white man's creation of life is an infinite reality that we cannot stop. IN ATTRECTATION

Mr. Jim Krogsrud attended a BIA Conference in Aberdeen, SD, September 11 & 12 concerning Student Rights and Responsibilities. It is a BIA policy that all BIA Schools have a handbook on Student Rights and Responsibilities.

On October 17, 1974, a committee was formed of 24 people, 12 students and 12 staff members, including Mr.James Krogsrud, Attorney for Legal Aid at UTETC. The Committee held meetings every Wednesday or Thursday up to November 20, 1974. The last meeting was held all day when the final draft was reviewed by the Committee.

The committee gathered all the rules and regulations here at UTETC with many of the present procedures still remaining, but some changes had to be made. There
