Born in Bismarck, but raised in Colorado, Pat considers both North Dakota and Colorado as his home.

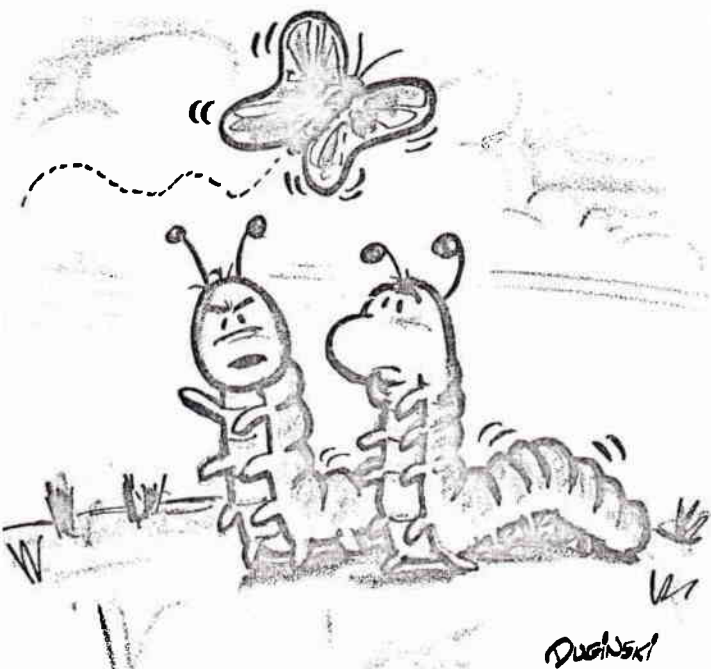

We had a fast tour of the Tribune's offices and production areas. We saw most of the facilities, from the Make-up department, to the loading of the finished newspapers.

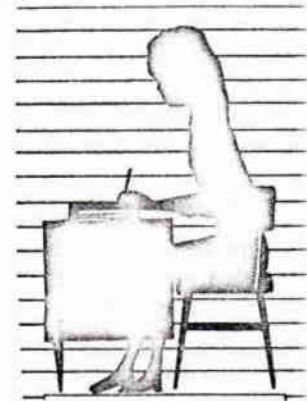
The Telephoto Wire Service was very interesting. It is a machine that sends and receives pictures over a wire, much like a telephone wire.

Once upon a time, the animals decided they must do something heroic to meet the problems of a new world. So they organized a school.

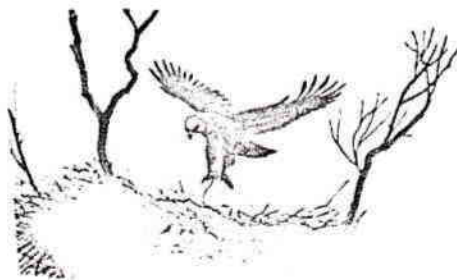
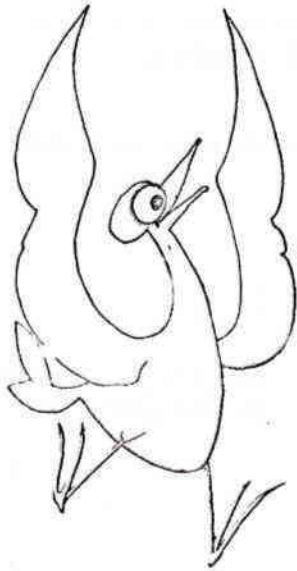
They adopted curriculum consisting of running, climbing, swimming, and flying. To make it easier to administer the curriculum, all the animals took all the subjects.

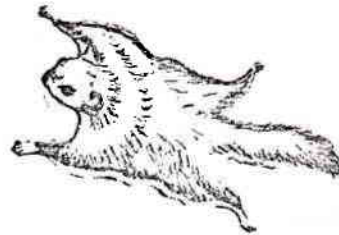
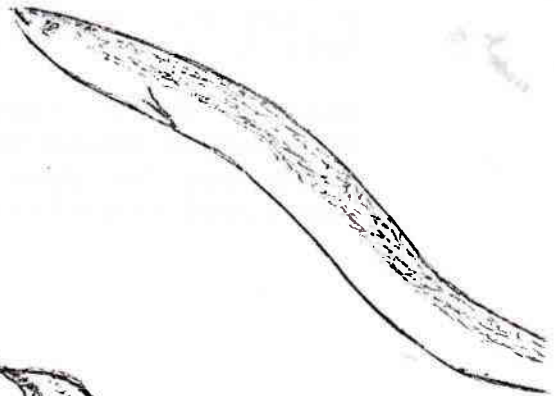
The eagle was a problem child and was disciplined severely. In the climbing class he beat all the other to the top of the tree but insisted on using his own way to get there.

Here's What's Cookin'

Pumpkin Harvest Bread

- 1½ Cup Sugar
- ½ Cup Vegetable Oil
- 2 Eggs Beaten
- 1 Cup Canned Pumpkin
- 1 Cup Old Fashioned Oats (quick cook)
- 1 Cup Flour
- 1¼ Teaspoon Baking Powder
- 1 Teaspoon Salt
- ½ Teaspoon Allspice
- ½ Teaspoon Cinnamon
- ½ Teaspoon Cloves
- ½ Teaspoon Nutmeg
- ½ Cup Chopped Pecans (Optional)

Combine sugar, oil, eggs, pumpkin and oats and beat well.

Sift dry ingredients and add to above mixture.

Pour into greased 9x5 inch loaf pan
Bake 350° for 1 hour and 15 minutes

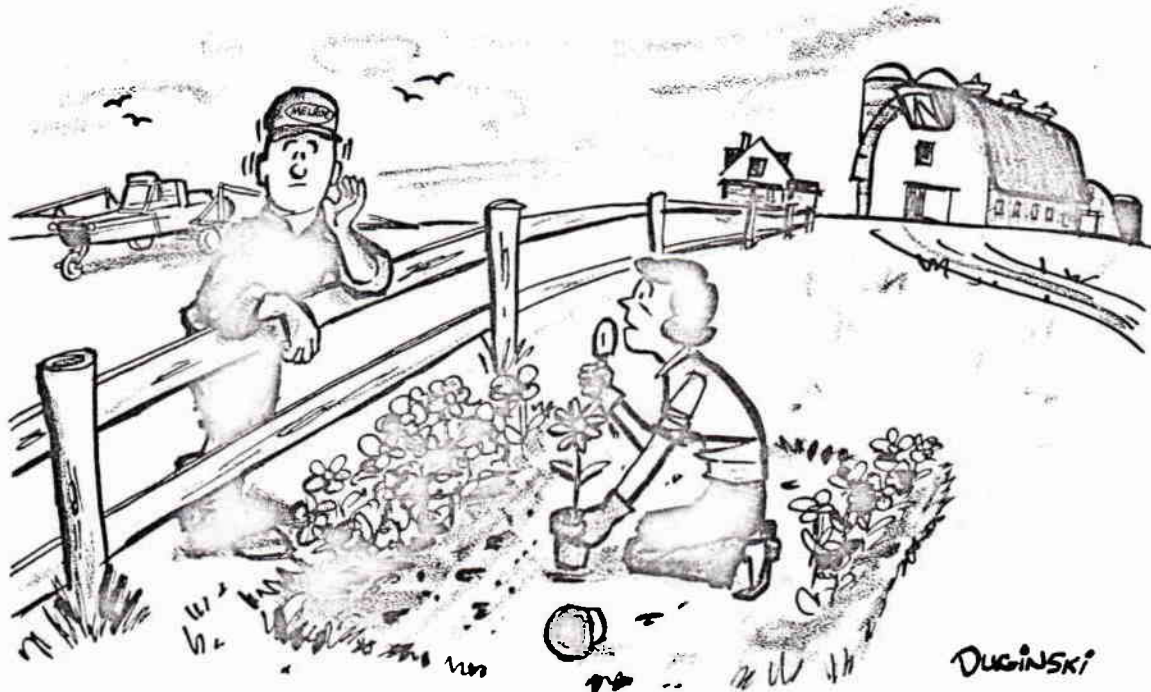
