Pumpkin Harvest Bread
11/2 Cup Sugar
1/2 Cup Vegetable Oil
2 Eggs Beaten
1 Cup Canned Pumpkin
1 Cup Old Fashioned Oats (quick cook)
1 Cup Flour
11/4 Teaspoon Baking Powder
1 Teaspoon Salt
$1 / 2$ Teaspoon Allspice
$\frac{1}{2}$ Teaspoon Cinnamon
$\frac{1}{2}$ Teaspoon Cloves
$\frac{1}{2}$ Teaspoon Nutmeg
$1 / 2$ Cup Chopped Pecans (Optional)
Combine sugar, oil, eggs, pumpkin and oats and beat well.
Sift dry ingredients and add to above mixture.
Pour into greased $9 \times 5$ inch loaf pan
Bake $350^{\circ}$ for 1 hour and 15 minutes
