

Each graduate received a red windbreaker with UTETC emblem from the student body. William Garcia. president.


made the presentation.


Summer is coming up and the pow-wows are coming. Everybody should dance. Get out there and show what you can do and be proud that you're Indian.

Before he came to the United Tribes, he taught children of military personnel in


Okinawa, Japan.




An ideal Indian woman was said to possess four virtues, which were wisdom, courage, generosity and chastity.
