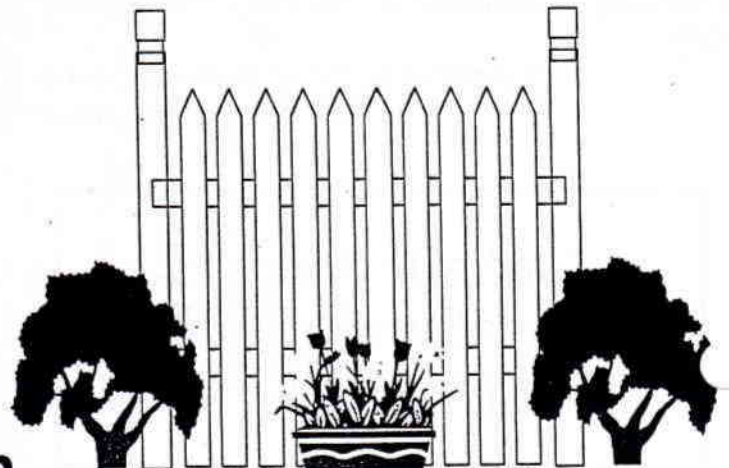

## Student Health Center Notes:

Immunization clinics for nursery, preschool and elementary children will soon be announced. Immunization records are in the process of getting reviewed by SHC staff. Parents will be notified if their child is due for an update.

Monthly headchecks will be held October 26, 27 & 28.

Students who are eligible for Medical Assistance, must submit their numbers to the Student Health Center as soon as possible.

### Methicillin-Resistant Staphylococcus Aureus

Methicillin-Resistant Staphylococcus Aureus is also known as MRSA for short. Staphylococcus Aureus is the most frequently isolated single bacterial species from surgical wounds. MRSA are bacteria that can cause a number of syndromes from skin infections and food poisoning, to severe invasive disease, which can result in pneumonia and/or septicemia or even death.

Anyone can get MRSA infection. Most susceptible are newborns, elderly, and persons with chronic health conditions. MRSA infections are usually introduced into an institution by an infected patient or health care worker. It can be acquired from other infected patients, health care workers or from people in the community.

MRSA bacteria are very common organisms that often live in the human nose. The main mode of transmission of MRSA is via health care workers' hands, which may become contaminated by contact with infected patients or by contact with infected body sites of the personnel themselves. Transmission is also by direct contact with a person who has a draining skin lesion. People can be carriers and infect others without having any symptoms themselves.

The most common infections are of the skin: impetigo, wounds and infected cuts. However, if the organism invades the blood stream, or lungs it can become very serious and even life threatening to the patient. Symptoms are extremely variable.

Diagnosis is made from a culture of a draining lesion, blood or nasal swab. MRSA is difficult to treat because it does not respond to most antibiotics resulting in limited drug choices. Skin infections should be washed with soap and water twice a day and covered with an antibiotic ointment and dressing, if they are draining.

If not seriously ill, infected persons can work or attend schools. Infected person should be educated to take precautions and follow good hygiene/hand washing principles. Persons who have open/drainings lesions are contagious and should avoid close physical contact.


