

New York: A Documentary Film traces New York's remarkable rise from the arrival of the Dutch in the early 17th century to the present day. The landmark 10-hour series, a special presentation of The American Experience, premieres in five two-hour episodes across five nights: Sunday, November 14 through Thursday, November 18, at 8 p.m. (CT).

Five years in the making, the series weaves together a vibrant tapestry of visual material, both contemporary and archival, with the reflections of an extraordinary chorus of distinguished New York artists, writers, architects, politicians, actors, directors and historians.

The United Nations Draft Declaration of the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, 1993

Indigenous peoples have the right to revitalize, use, develop and transmit to future generations their histories, languages, oral traditions, philosophies, writing systems and literatures, and to designate and retain their own names for communities, places and persons.

Indigenous children have the right to all levels and forms of education of the State. All indigenous peoples also have the right to establish and control their educational systems and institutions providing education in their own languages, in a manner appropriate to their cultural methods of teaching and learning.

STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY SOLICITING HOLIDAY TREE ORNAMENTS

BISMARCK -- The holiday season is approaching, and the State Historical Society of North Dakota is seeking hand-made ornaments from North Dakotans for its annual holiday tree.

School children and members of civic and social clubs are especially encouraged to make an ornament or several ornaments for the tree. All ornaments submitted will be hung on the tree.

Displayed at the North Dakota Heritage Center in Bismarck, the tree will be on view beginning Wednesday, November 24 through January 3, 2000. It has always been decorated with ornaments handmade by North Dakotans. This year's tree will be decorated with ornaments representing traditional, ethnic or historical themes.

The call for holiday tree ornaments is open to all North Dakotans, with only these guidelines:

- The ornaments must be handmade. No kits.
- All materials and techniques are acceptable. If the ornaments are made of material such as pasta, dough art or cookie dough, please thoroughly seal them.
- Each ornament should be ready to hang. Attach a hanger, ribbon or string.
- On the back of each ornament, write your name, town and "1999."
- All ornaments will become the property of the State Historical Society of North Dakota and will not be returned.
- All ornaments submitted will be hung on the tree.
- The deadline for receiving ornaments is Friday, November 19.
