

UTTC Student President and Art/Art Marketing student Katie Beheler welcomes the visiting delegations to the campus during the luncheons.




UND President Kupchella notes his interest in serving the Indian populations and working with the United Tribes and the Tribal Colleges in North Dakota.

- Over 4000 reports of child abuse and/or neglect were received in North Dakota affecting over 5000 children.
- Of these, over 3000 had services required or recommended.
 - Over 50 % involved children 8 years and younger.
 - Over 1400 ND children were found to have been neglected or psychologically (emotionally) abused.
 - 450+ ND children were physically or sexually abused.
 - 1000+ ND children suffered from abuse and/or neglect.
