Class of 2000 marks UTTC's 31st year

Bismarck, ND - United Tribes Technical College (UTTC) graduation is scheduled for May 5, 2000 with 77 graduates from 20 different tribal nations who will receive the Associate of Applied Science degree or special certificates in 12 different fields. The graduation, where some 700 are expected to gather at the Lone Star Arena, will be at 1:00 pm (CDT) and will include tribal leaders, family members, faculty and staff, and

special guests from throughout the Great Plains.

J. Kurt Luger will be the keynote speaker and is currently the executive director of the Great Plains Indian Gaming Association, Bismarck, orth Dakota. Luger has a strong history of effectively managing tribal programs at the Cheyenne River Sioux, South Dakota, and the Quinault Indian Nation, Taholah, Washington. An enrolled member of the Cheyenne River Sioux Tribe, Eagle Butte, South Dakota, he has over 18 years of experience in working on tribal rights issues with such organizations as the National Congress of American Indians, and is an expert on gaming issues which impact the Great Plains Region with over 16 tribes from North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota and Nebraska.

He will address graduates and their class motto of "If you dream it,

you can achieve it. If you live it, you can become it."

Remarks will also be provided by Chairman Charles W. Murphy, UTTC Board, and Standing Rock Sioux Tribe located in North Dakota and South Dakota, along with comments from other attending tribal leaders and


UTTC President David M. Gipp.

UTTC, which opened its doors July 1, 1969, was founded by tribal leaders to provide training and education in an American Indian setting and represents the first tribally controlled postsecondary vocational educational institution to be founded at an intertribal level. Over 10,000 students have been served by the school from as many as 40 tribes from throughout the nation.


Tribal owners are represented on a ten member board by the elected tribal chairman and one delegate from five tribes, including The Spirit ake Dakota Nation, The Sisseton-Wahpeton Sioux Tribe, The Standing ock Sioux Tribe, The Three Affiliated Tribes of Fort Berthold, and The

Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa.

The College's graduations included the preschool (pictured), ceremonial at Theodore Jamerson Elementary School (TJES), and the main college graduation on May 5, 2000.



In addition, UTTC will graduate its first class from the newly established Injury Prevention Program, a program designed to address the critical problems of injury in American Indian communities across the nation.

Mr. Richard Smith, Indian Health Service Injury Prevention Coordinator, Rockville, Maryland, will attend this historic occasion. UTTC offers the first undergraduate program among both two and four year degree granting institutions in the nation. Graduates represent a new and developing profession among tribal nations.

UTTC offers over 20 programs and is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. A key part of the school mission is to focus on the education and development of the American Indian Family. Thus, the college provides early childhood services to dependents of the adults through two daycare centers and a K-8, Theodore Jamerson Elementary School, on the 105 acre campus.










