Enforcement blitzes planned across North Dakota Goal to increase seat belt usage

Every three days in North Dakota, a vehicle crash claims another life.

Last year, 119 people lost their lives on the highways of North Dakota. Many of those 119 may still be alive if they had been wearing a seat belt.

Only 46.7 percent of North Dakota drivers and front seat passengers wear their seat belts, well below the national average of 68 percent.

The reluctance to buckle up contributes heavily to the severity of vehicle crashes each year, changing many lives. Some crash victims find it hard to perform simple daily tasks. Others aren't so lucky.

The North Dakota Department of Transportation (NDDOT) was recently awarded a grant from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). This grant will be used to increase seat belt use with a combination of high visibility enforcement and public information.

Using grant funds, NDDOT will coordinate media events and enforcement blitzes by law enforcement agencies. Four planned blitz activities will take place within the next 12 months across North Dakota. The theme for these activities, "Click It or Ticket," is derived from one of the secondary messages of the "Do Buckle, Don't Booze" campaign.

The Labor Day Enforcement Blitz is set for the beginning of September in the Fargo, Grand Forks, Bismarck, and Dickinson areas. In this concentrated effort, local and state enforcement agencies will heavily enforce the use of seat belts. Public education and media announcements will also be a part of the blitz activity.

Now is the time for every North Dakota citizen to take responsibility and do something to save their own life. Make it second nature to buckle up every time you get into a vehicle. Don't become another statistic. It can happen to you.
