

NAME WHITE CLOUD'S CALF

THE NATIONAL BUFFALO MUSEUM IS REQUESTING THE PUBLIC'S ASSISTANCE IN NAMING WHITE CLOUD'S FIRST BORN CALF.

White Cloud, the albino buffalo that resides with the Herd at the National Buffalo Museum in Jamestown, North Dakota recently gave birth to her first calf. It has been confirmed that the calf was born on White Cloud's 4th Birthday, while Jamestown was busy celebrating this special day. It appeared that she was the bashfulness "birthday girl" that weekend, since she was not out and about as often as her "well-wishers" would have liked. The excitement spanned the entire city though, when it was discovered that the reason for her quiet avoidance was that she had given birth to her first calf.

White Cloud was born on the Shirek Buffalo Farm in Michigan, North Dakota on July 10, 1996. She joined the herd at the site of the National Buffalo Museum in May of 1997 as a result of a lease arrangement with the owners and has been fascinating visitors from near and far ever since. "The birth of the calf did come as a bit of a surprise for all of us since she did not test positive last fall," commented Donna Zimmerman, Director of the National Buffalo Museum. For those who are wondering, the calf is brown in color and is a female. "To watch her move about the pasture, she appears to be just another calf until she snuggles up to her not so ordinary Mom", added Zimmerman.

In the weeks following the calf's birth, National Buffalo Museum representatives pondered the dilemma of the "perfect name" for such an extraordinary animal. After much deliberation, it was decided that the task of "naming the calf" should not be taken lightly and is too big of a job for just a few people. Thus, the public is encouraged to submit names for White Cloud's calf. Submit name ideas in writing to: "Name White Cloud's Calf", National Buffalo Museum, P.O. Box 1712, Jamestown, ND 58401. Only written submissions will be considered. Submissions should include the name, address and phone number of the person making it, so that they can be contacted in the event that their name request is chosen.

The deadline to submit a name is November 30, 2000. A fund to assist with care and feeding expenses of both White Cloud and her calf has been established. Contributions to the fund are welcome along with name entries. Be a "Lifesaver", buckle up!

Wednesday, July 26, 2000, was "Be a "Lifesaver", buckle up!" day at the North Dakota State Fair and included a number of activities conducted by the North Dakota Department of Transportation (NDDOT).



As fair goers entered the main parking lot at the fair grounds, they were awarded Lifesaver candy for wearing seat belts. A reminder ticket was given to those drivers and passengers not buckled up.

Representatives from NDDOT also conducted seat belt surveys at the entrance of

the parking lot. The morning survey, conducted from 9:00 a.m. until noon, noted 68 percent of the females were wearing seat belts while 57 percent of the males buckled up. Sixty percent of all drivers and passengers entering the lot were wearing seat belts during those three hours.

The afternoon survey, conducted from 4:00 - 6:00 p.m., showed 74 percent of the females buckled up with 62 percent of the males wearing seat belts. Sixty-five percent of the people entering the lot during those hours were buckled up.

Dawn Olson, NDDOT Traffic Safety Program Manager, and LoAnn Miller, "Do Buckle, Don't Booze" Campaign Coordinator, were quests of 97 KICKS FM in Minot, who conducted a live remote from the State Fair from 7:00 - 9:00 p.m. They discussed the "Do Buckle, Don't Booze" campaign goals, objectives, traffic statistics, and the importance of occupant protec-

The whole day was a huge success! Stories were shared from people who had lost loved one's not wearing seat belts to people whose lives were saved from being buckled up! The entire day the message was clear: Be a " Lifesaver", buckle up!

Congratulations North Dakota Highway Patrol!

The North Dakota Highway Patrol garnered third place in the Championship class in the 1999 National Chiefs' Challenge sponsored by the International Association of Chiefs of Police in partnership with National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. The North Dakota Highway Patrol was the first place winner of the 1998 Challenge.

The Challenge is an annual contest allowing hundreds of police agencies and sheriff departments to challenge each other to develop the best traffic safety program. Agencies compete in the Challenge by size and type of agency. Entries are reviewed by a panel of traffic safety specialists for elements of a successful life saving traffic safety program. Judging criteria included the essentials of a police traffic safety program: effective policies, officer training, enforcement, and public awareness activities.

The North Dakota Department of Transportation (NDDOT) was recently awarded a grant from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) to increase seat belt use with a combination of high visibility enforcement and public information.

Using grant funds, NDDOT will coordinate media events and enforcement blitzes by law enforcement agencies. Four planned blitz activities will take place within the next 12 months across North Dakota. The theme for these activities, "Click It or Law Enforcement Will Ticket" is derived from one of the secondary messages of the "Do Buckle, Don't Booze" campaign.

The Labor Day Enforcement Blitz was held August 28 through September 10 in the Fargo, Grand Forks, Bismarck, and Dickinson areas. In this concentrated effort, local and state enforcement agencies heavily enforced the use of seat belts. Public education and media announcements were also be a part of the blitz activity.


Saved By The Belt!

Brevig is a survivor of an April 14, 2000, car crash north of Belfield. Her life and the lives of three youths in the second car were spared by the use of safety restraints.

North Dakota Highway Patrol Capt. Alan Billehus presented Brevig with a "Saved by the Belt" award.

Brevig is grateful the seat belt saved her life. "I've always used my seat belt while out on the highway. Since the accident, I wear it in town too," she said.
