UTTC celebrates return of the bison nation



BISMARCK, **ND** – For Native American Heritage month in November, United Tribes Technical College is hosting its cultural activities around the theme - "Celebrating the Return of the P'te Oyate (Bison Nation."

"As a tribal college, we value the importance of Native American culture and language on a year-round basis," said UTTC President Dr. David Gipp. "Because November is Native American month here in North Dakota, we are offering activities for the public as well as for our students and staff."

The cultural theme was selected based on the work of the Northern Plains Bison Education Network, a unique education project developed collaboratively the past three years by UTTC and nine other Tribal colleges in the region.

"We are seeing a renewed connection between Native people and the bison," commented Wendell White Eyes, UTTC cultural committee chair and vocational welding instructor. "Indian Tribes and colleges are working to reestablish cultural, spiritual, nutritional, and economic ties with the bison world. This is worth celebrating as we progress into the new millennium."

On November 17-18th, a variety of Native American professional and cultural resources people including Keith Bear, Rick and Ethlene Two Dogs, Marvin Bald Eagle Youngman, John Buckley, Felix Kidder, Sandy Poitra, Andy Vasquez, Joe McGillis, and Sissy Goodhouse will offer a variety of presentations on the UTTC campus. A buffalo feed on Saturday evening, November 18th will cap week-end activities.

Among other campus-based activities, students at UTTC's Theodore Jamerson Elementary School will select a name for their bison calf adopted from the Standing Rock Sioux Tribal bison herd. "Because the bison are considered relatives, our teachers will focus some classroom activities on helping our your people to understand what it takes to be good relatives among their Indian families and communities," said TJES principal Sam Azure.


