



Your example helps your children learn to handle anger. Be a good role model. Opt for the counting cure if needed. Count to 10 20 or 100. Use your kitchen timer for "time out" before disciplining. Remember that everyone slips up at times, including your children.

Count your blessings; these include the children that you love. Organize time away from your children so you enjoy your times together. Out of ideas to handle anger? Consider parenting classes or professional counseling. Learn which "cool down" methods work for you and use them.

Dr. Ramona Klein presents workshop

On Friday, March 23, Dr. Ramona Klein, Chair of the Education Department at the University of Mary and expert in the field of learning disabilities presented an informative workshop on the characteristics of people with learning disabilities.

The two-hour workshop was held in the Exhibit Center of the Skills Center on the UTTC Campus and was attended by approximately 25 UTTC faculty members and staff. The attendees not only learned how to identify students that may have learning disabilities, but also were made keenly aware of how difficult learning can be for someone with a learning disability.

Based on the results of a survey, the participants in the workshop indicated that they gained a new understanding of what constitutes a learning disability and most stated that they were more comfortable in referring for services a student whom they suspected might have a learning disability. A majority of the participants also checked that they would like to learn more about the area of learning disabilities in the future.

The workshop was sponsored by the Academic Services Center and Student Support Services with funding from the Bush Grant for Faculty and Professional Development. The staff of the Academic Service Center and Student Support Services would like to thank all of the people who attended the workshop as well ξ as the people who helped to make the workshop a success. With faculty and staff working cooperatively, we can optimize the learning experience for *all* students who attend United Tribes.



I. Brain and Nervous System:

- Impaired memory, judgement and concentration
- Lying to full of gaps of memory (blackouts)
- Lack of coordination when walking
- Numbness, tingling in hands and feet
- Malnutrition, fatigue
- Biological urges to ingest alcohol
- II. Liver:
 - Abdominal pain
 - Jaundice
 - Fluid buildup in abdomen
 - Blood vessels break or swell
 - Red face, and palms
 - Bruising
- III. Gastrointestinal System:
 - Poor eating habits
 - Heartburn, nausea, vomiting, gastric pain
 - Mouth, throat, stomach irritation
 - Diarrhea or constipation
 - Weight loss or gain
 - Malnutrition

IV. Respiratory System:

- Diminished cough reflex
- Difficulty in exporting air
- V. Cardiovascular System:
 - Elevated pulse
 - Shortness of breath
 - Decreased exercise tolerance
 - Shortness of breath
 - Gasping for breath when sleeping
- VI. Skeletal System:
 - Generalized weakness
 - Muscle wasting
 - Cramps in calves, and feet
 - Muscle tension in jaw, neck and shoulder
- V. Skin:
 - Wrinkles and lines consistent with older person
 - Dryness and itching
 - Enlarging of nose (bulb nose)
 - Skin blisters (purple, red)
