

This are not clear and do not reproduce well. Also, if submitting an article needing photos make sure they are attached.
- 5. All articles should be submitted ONE WEEK IN ADVANCE. All articles submitted for the newsletter should be in Arrow Graphics the preceding Monday before the next newsletter is due. (1 week in advance.) Any late article will be included in the following week's newsletter.

We receive a lot of articles and it takes 2-3 days to type all of the articles. **PLEASE** adhere to the deadline and policy. The newsletter is distributed by Monday.



"UTTC Career Fair 2001"

On Thursday, November 29th United Tribes Technical College is hosting a career fair for senior high school students from our region and will be held in the James Henry Community Building (large gym). We've invited 30 area high schools to our Career Fair and we are planning on approximately 100 -150 students visiting our campus this coming week. The event will be held from 10:00 A.M. to 2:00 P.M. I have asked that all of our various departments to set up booths (table displays) and provide pertinent information regarding their individual program.

Briefly, we feel that it is very important for prospective students to come here and see our beautiful campus here in Bismarck, North Dakota. It is equally important that high school seniors be afforded an opportunity to meet our outstanding faculty and staff and discuss their career options. Ideally, this is the proper way for high school seniors to make an informed decision before selecting a college that will best meet their career goals. Several years ago, we conducted an on-campus survey of UTTC students and found out that 70 percent of our students chose to come to United Tribes based upon the programs we offer. Approximately, 30 percent of our students chose United Tribes because of the cultural environment we provide. Certainly, there are other factors including family housing, the infant toddler center, child development center, our elementary school located on-campus, and other support services that we provide UTTC students.

Weekly WIC Question


WIC - a nutrition program for women, infants and children. Call Ext. 420 to arrange your appointment.

QUESTION: The staff person at WIC stated my child was above the "95th percentile" in body mass index. She said someone would discuss some ideas for my child to be more active. What does that mean?

ANSWER: Body mass index is the amount of fat versus lean body tissue an individual person is carrying around. All people are different sizes. Size depends on genetics, but also on the amount of food eaten and exercise done by the individual. The goal is to have the healthiest body possible, no matter the individual's age. A child who has a body mass index that shows more fat than lean muscle is at high risk of developing low self-esteem, as well as diseases such as diabetes and heart disease at an early age.

To reduce the amount of body fat and increase the amount of lean muscle, a child should be encouraged to exercise everyday. A child's "job" is to run, play tag, ride bicycle, climb, go sledding and create other active games. We should ask, Is my child "employed" with his job or am I teaching "unemployment" by allowing TV, computers, and electronic games to replace normal childhood activity? The best thing we can do for our children is to be a role model - go outdoors, play tag and ball with them, walk with them, learn to cross-country ski, go sledding, join active sports, and be happy about being able to move our bodies.

North Dakotans have something to celebrate this holiday season

Statewide surveys indicate that seat belt use is up by 10 percent throughout the state. This is

a positive sign that motorist are choosing to take the responsible road and buckle up. "A seat belt is the single-most efficient way to protect yourself in the event of a crash. Seat belts increase the chance of survival tremendously," said Marsha M. Lembke, Director of the North Dakota Department of Transportation Drivers License and Traffic Safety Division.

Given that motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of

death for people ages zero to 20, seat belt use is especially important for our children and young adult population. Take the extra time to drive safely and to **wear your** seat belt. Make certain your children are buckled up as well. Together, let's make sure everyone is around to enjoy this holiday season.

United Tribes Intertribal Programs

The United Tribes' Center for Economic Outreach was established in the spring of 2001 in response to the growing need for tribal economic development research, technical assistance, and educational services in the northern plains region (North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Wyoming, Utah, and Colorado). The regional office is located in Denver, Colorado. The Center for Economic Outreach is a pilot project for the Economic Development Administration (EDA). The goal of the UTTC project is to become the first Tribal University Center in the country.

The primary purpose of the Center for Economic Outreach is to serve as a catalyst for economic research and development impacting tribes and tribal entities throughout the service area. The will be accomplished by providing

four specific areas including: 1) Information Clearinghouse, 2) Training, 3) Technical Assistance, and 4) Technology Transfer.

The extensive resources of United Tribes will be made available to various tribal organizations that can benefit from job and income creation and job retention efforts. The CEO is funded by the U.S. Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration.

In September 2001, United Tribes was awarded a Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) grant. These funds will be used to establish a national level resource for tribal/reservation predisaster mitigation activities, create a Center for Excellence for tribal/reservation coordination for Project Impact, and to conduct training in emergency management for tribal organizations.

Criminal Justice Advisory Board Meeting

The first Criminal Justice Advisory Board meeting was held in Bismarck on Tuesday, November 20, 2001 to discuss the program, including curriculum and related issues. Members of the advisory board include Arnie Schimke, retired captain for the North Dakota Highway Patrol, Monty Gibson, Deputy Director elect for the BIA police academy at Artesia, New Mexico, Bill Lord, UTTC interim chair, and Mark Wininger, UTTC instructor. Not present were Joe

Walker, UTTC Interim Instructor, Lt. Rohrer, Bismarck Police Department, and Elmer Four Dance, BIA Law Enforcement from the Aberdeen Area Office. Other UTTC representatives on hand included Dr. David Gipp, President, Dr. John Derby, Academic Dean, and Sheri Bearking-Baker, Instructor.

Dr. Derby gave the advisory board a brief update of the criminal justice program and the need to involve local, state, BIA, and tribal police on the advisory board. Dr. Gipp spoke briefly on the need to meet the law enforcement needs of the tribes in North Dakota and surrounding states.

There were a number of topics discussed including a curriculum update by Sheri Bearking-Baker, a partnership agreement with the BIA

to train tribal police in the northern plains region at UTTC, and articulation agreements with regional 4-year colleges and universities at the bachelor's level. Monty Gibson, newly-selected Deputy Director for the BIA Police Academy in Artesia, New Mexico mentioned a number of issues/concerns in order to meet the law enforcement needs for the reservations in both Dakotas and his desire for the BIA to develop a partnership with United Tribes Technical College in the near future. UTTC will be working on the development of a partnership agreement with the BIA for consideration.

The next advisory board meeting is scheduled for March 19, 2002.

Law enforcement cautions residents to be particularly careful this holiday season

North Dakota residents should expect additional patrol and enforcement of impaired driving violations throughout the holiday season. December has been designated 3-D Month (Drunk, Drugged, and Driving) by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). 3-D Month focuses on the impacts and elimination of drunk and drugged driving. Last year, drugs including alcohol were considered a contri-

buting factor in 44 percent of all North Dakota's fatal crashes. December is the optimum time to increase awareness and enforcement of impaired driving violations. Last year more people were killed in car crashes over the winter holidays than all of the other holidays combined.

In October, North Dakota had already surpassed last year's total number of fatalities. That is why the "Do Buckle, Don't Booze" campaign, a statewide effort to increase seat belt use while decreasing impaired driving, will partner with North Dakota media, the faith community, local schools, and state law enforcement to educate residents on the risks of impaired driving. Impaired driving is a serious offense in North Dakota, one which comes with a maximum penalty of 30 days imprisonment and/or \$500 fine, in addition to higher insurance rates.




